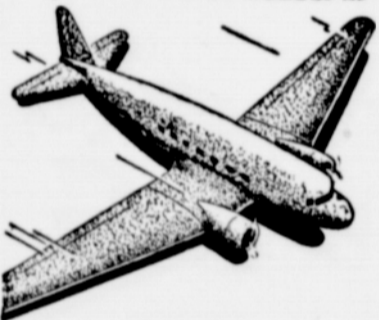

● HARBOR NEWS To Form Study Group At Church

Formation of two study groups at St. Timothy's Church, corner of Fir Street and Azalea Park Road, was announced his week by the Vicar, the Rev. John Shideler. A Young Peoples' Study Group for teenagers will meet on Thursday evenings at 7 p. m. beginning October 7, and an Adult Study Group will meet on Friday evenings at 8 p. m., beginning October 8.

Both groups will study and discuss the basic teachings of the Christian faith, how the Church began and how the Church has come to us, and the traditions of the Protestant Episcopal Church and the Anglican Communion.

Each group is open to all who wish to attend, the only requirement being curiosity as to the nature of the Christian Faith and the Christian Church, and a desire to learn.

Those who attend throughout the series of ten meetings will be ready to be received into the Communion of the Episcopal Church through the sacrament of Confirmation at the next visit of the Bishop, if they so desire. The adult Study Group should be of interest to all, as it provides an opportunity to ask questions concerning the deepest meaning of life. It will be of particular interest to parents whose children have been baptized or are about to be baptized, to all who have sponsored children in baptism, to Sunday School teachers and others who are given charge of the education of children, and to all lay men and women who are interested and concerned and who wish to be better informed.
