

"ADOPTS" 11 YEAR OLD ITALIAN THROUGH FOSTER PARENTS PLAN

Mrs. Bert De Moss, Brookings, has "adopted" Sebastiano Giaquinto, 11½ year old Italian boy through Foster Parents' Plan for Children, Inc., it was announced by Plan headquarters at 43 West 61st street, New York City, 23.

Sebastiano never knew his father, Giovanni Battista Gisquinto was in the army at the outbreak of the war, and was sent over to Russia in 1942. Taken prisoner of war shortly after, he was sent to a concentration camp, where he died of malnutrition on March 10, 1945 shortly before the liberation of Europe.

His widow, Sebastiano and his year older brother Vincenz now receive a weekly pension of \$5.25. The child's mother used to do part time domestic work, so as to increase this small income, but she is now too ill to work, being affected with heart trouble and anemia and chronic appendicitis. PLANS is the only help the family receive, and the food and clothing packages plus medicine and a monthly cash grant of \$8.00 are a godsend to these people and represent their cash resource.

They live in a dingy room, very poorly furnished with two beds, a wardrobe, two chests, a table and some shaky chairs. The rent is \$1.80 per month, gas and electricity amount to \$4.80 per month.

Sebastiano has grown stronger since joining the PLAN, but he is still suffering from chronic

bronchial catarrh, which has plagued him for many years. He has become a handsome boy, with light brown hair and blue eyes, and his expression is sweeter, although he is still melancholy. He is now in the 4th elementary grade, and of the subjects he likes arithmetic best. When he finishes the 5th grade, the boy would like to learn a trade, but he is still undecided, which trade; his hobby is soccer ball—but he is not allowed to play it, because of his illness. Sebastiano is sociable and affectionate, very attached to mother and brother, and extremely grateful for the help he is receiving.

Foster Parents' Plan has cared for more than 73,000 war children. It is now operating in Belgium, England, France, Western Germany, Holland, Italy and Korea.

Foster Parents' Plan for War Children does not do mass relief; each child is treated as an individual. "Adoption" is financial, not legal. The Foster Parent merely promises to contribute \$15.00 monthly towards the child's support, for at least a year. In return, the Foster Parent receives a brief history of the child and a photograph, and correspondence through the Plan office is encouraged, since the children need the feeling of being loved and belonging to someone, someplace.

GARDEN CORNER

This is bulb planting time. It is perennial-planting time. 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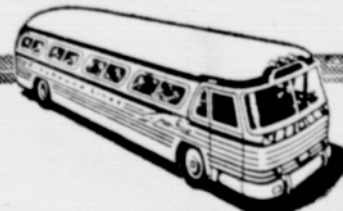
