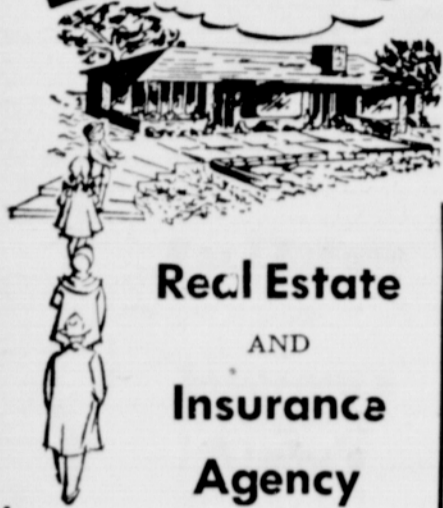

## NEUBERGER HITS PRIVATE POWER

Richard L. Neuberger, candidate for U. S. Senator, told a group of Brookings-Harbor people that "this administration is killing the electrical power program". Neuberger visited the area in his whirlwind campaign Friday night, giving a short talk at the Chetco Grange Hall.

Neuberger is the democratic nominee for U. S. Senator, and is opposing Sen. Guy Cordon. He is a writer, and lecturer, and is currently a state senator. His wife, Maurine, an assembly woman, was also present at the meeting.

Neuberger was introduced by Charles Echols. The party also included Don Brooks, Ivan Laird, Dave and Wickes Shaw, publishers of the Curry County Reporter.

Most of Neuberger's talk was centered around his views on electric power. He said that he has asked for a debate with Cordon on the power question, but has received no satisfaction. He said that Bonneville is helping us, and is "paying for itself", and now "we are told we must junk it all for something called partnership".

Talking about partnership Neuberger said that the government gets the fish ladders, locks, floodgates, and the powerhouse goes to private companies. He talked about the postage stamp rate, which provides that those on this end of the Bonneville line gets the same rates as those in Portland. Neuberger said that Cordon's bill for the John Day dam does not provide that.

The democratic candidate attacked COPCO, and their monopoly, and the \$547,000 private electrical lobby in Washington.

He listed his power policy as 1, Public preference clause; 2, Federal transmission lines to cities; 3, Restoration of the Bonneville staff; 4, Low cost power; 5, Endorsing REA; 6, Opposing Partnership program; 8, In favor of John Day and Hells Canyon dams, as like the Bonneville dam. Neuberger also went into farm policy, and said that under the present administration farm prices have decreased 14 percent, but the market prices to the housewife is just as high.

He attacked Cordon's "give-away" of the tide land oil to the four states benefiting, when the money could have gone to the "oil for education" fund.

Neuberger said that lumbering and farming are our big basic industries, but he said, not one of our six Oregon members of Congress are on either committee. He vowed to get on the committee if elected.

He closed by telling the group that one political party has been in power for 40 years—and "its time to change in Oregon".

Mr. Al Norblad, past president of the Association, is now preparing a new set of By-laws to be presented at the meeting. The contemplated World's Fair for 1959 and 1960 is to be explained and discussed.

The officers for Curry County are: Vice president, Pete Lesmeister, Brookings; Directors: M. E. Kelly, Port Orford; Geo. R. Dickinson, Gold Beach; Merrill Bullock, Brookings; and Judge Guy Forsyth, Gold Beach. There are two past presidents from Curry County, of the Oregon Coast Association, Geo. Dickinson, and Charles Grayshel, Brookings.
