

Bank Deposit Up In U. S. National Over 37 Million

Total deposits at the United States National Bank have increased more than 37 million dollars since the end of September, 1953.

Total deposits for the state-wide system stand at \$675,805,650 as of October 7 as compared with \$638,789,631 on September 30, 1953.

The Brookings branch reported deposits totaling \$3,505,681.00, according to E. L. Morton, manager.

The U. S. National now shows loans and discounts in the amount of \$245,898,881. Loans and discounts for the Brookings branch was \$1,401,256.90.

Growing in size and service to the state of Oregon, the U. S. National now lists total resources of \$732,933,021, a gain of well over 39 million dollars in the past 12 months.

Announcement was made October 9 of a proposed merger of the U. S. National bank, Commercial Bank of Oregon with 11 branches and the Bank of Albany which would widen the service of the U. S. National in the state. The merger will be submitted to the shareholders of the three banks for ratification the latter part of November.

Plan To Double Plywood Sales In Next 20 Years

Despite a rosy forecast that plywood demand may double in the next 20 years, industry leaders in the annual meeting recently at Tacoma, focused attention on the immediate objective of boosting sales to keep pace with the recent growth of new plants.

Some 100 manufacturers were in attendance representing most of the 94-factory industry which this year will invest two and a half million dollars in advertising to expand markets. Combined these firms turn out three fourths of the nation's plywood.

The national sales-promotion program is carried out by Douglas Fir Plywood Association with Tacoma as headquarters.

Highlight of the meeting was a summary by E. W. Daniels, chairman of the industry promotion committee, of a national survey that foresees softwood plywood sales of 7.5 billion feet in 1975 as against the current rate of 3.7 billion feet. Daniels, past president of Harbor Plywood Corp., was talking from a market study by Stanford Research Institute.

It was also brought out at the meeting that weekly sales have averaged 73 million feet, against a productive capacity of 83 million feet, pushed to this figure by a dozen new plants in the past year and a half.
