**CORDON HOLDS SLIGHT EDGE IN SENATE RACE**

United States Senator Guy Cordon holds a thin edge over his opponent, Richard L. Neuberger, in his race for re-election according to latest returns of a public opinion poll being made for his committee, Wm. H. Steiwer, chairman of the Cordon for Senator Committee reports.

These same polls give Governor Paul L. Patterson a long lead in his campaign to defeat Joseph K. Carson, Jr. for the governorship and indicate the election of all four Republican candidates for Congress.

Since April the polls show that Cordon has gained consistently

in Multnomah county while losing some support outstate, Steiwer said. Latest Multnomah county compilations give Cordon 36 percent, Neuberger 41 percent with 23 percent undecided.

Combined totals in the state outside of Multnomah county give Cordon 40 percent, Neuberger 34 percent with 26 percent undecided.

Only in two outstate counties in Cordon behind, according to the poll. Clackamas county returns give Cordon 36 percent, Neuberger 50 percent, no opinion 14 percent. Union county totals give Cordon 34 percent, Neuberger 50 percent, no opinion 16 percent.

Current trends which have been maintained through all the polls taken from April to the last week of September favor Cordon and if continued would insure his election, Steiwer said. The totals:

regions of the country so farmers will not be asked about crops not grown in their area.

In cases where a farmer has not kept an exact record of his production, his estimate will be a good answer. Farmers will receive a questionnaire in the mail with a request from the Director of the Census that they get their answers filled in before the enumerator comes. Questionnaires will be mailed to farmers in Western Oregon during the last week in October, beginning on November 3rd. Census enumerators will begin calling on farmers in this area for their reports. The Census headquarters for the local area is located at the Benton County Court house, Corvallis, Oregon. The supervisor in charge of this office is Don C. Mote.

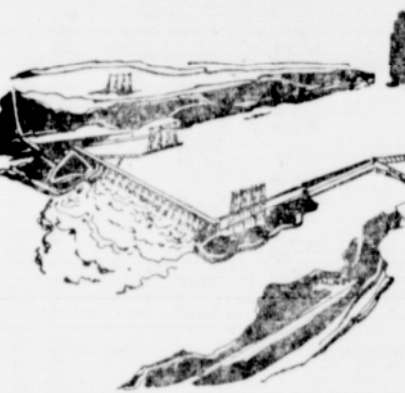
What about the Partnership Plan? Does the government pay for the non-income features?

Remember, political hot air has never yet produced a kilowatt.

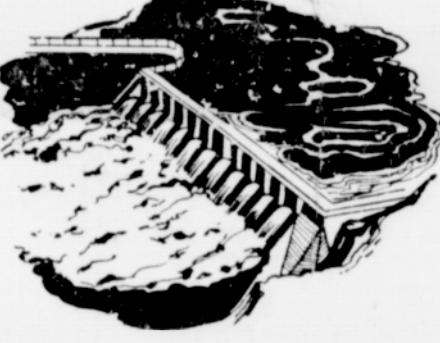

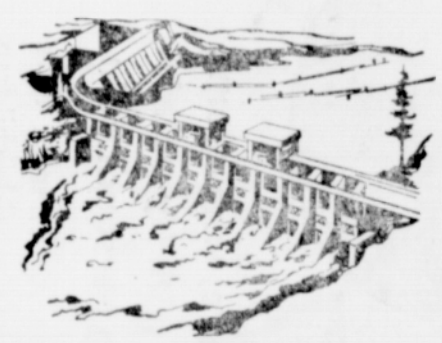
**CHIEF JOSEPH DAM**

As usual Cordon's effectiveness with both Democrats and Republicans in the U. S. Senate made possible larger appropriations than House recommendations. For this project Cordon has secured a total to date of \$104,766,000—\$10,122,000 more than House recommendations.



**ALBION FALLS DAM**

Cordon introduced legislation to authorize this project and secured funds for its continued construction while the Truman no-new-starts policy was in effect after the House of Representatives had refused to appropriate any funds for that purpose.



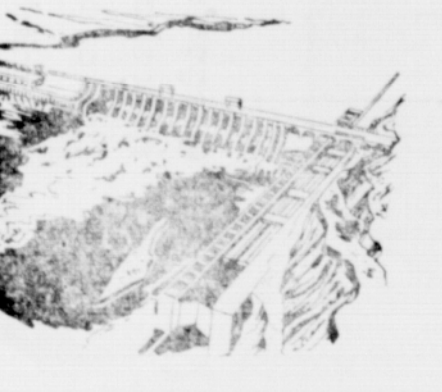
**COUGAR DAM**

The 83rd Congress appropriated \$150,000 for planning the proposed partnership construction of this project on the South Fork of the McKenzie river. The Federal-Power-or-nothing crowd fought the project tooth and toenail even though the local partner was a municipal power district.



**JOHN DAY DAM**

The John Day Dam between The Dalles and McNary Dams will cost around \$320,000,000 to build. In the last Congress Cordon introduced a bill to authorize construction of this dam with the local partners, public and private, putting up more than half the cost of the dam in the form of a prepaid power contract (preference going to Oregon) and the federal government retaining 100% ownership of the entire project as a part of the multiple purpose development of the Columbia River Basin.



**HELLS CANYON DAM**

It is a matter of record that Cordon introduced the only Hell's Canyon authorization attempt which ever came to a clear vote on the floor of the U. S. Senate. At that time Cordon's proposal was opposed by the public-power-or-nothing crowd in the U. S. Senate. There are other suitable dam sites on the Snake. Why hold out for one that the Congress has refused to authorize? Let's get something built and start the generators turning! Re-Elect Cordon!



On the left we list just a few of the power projects which Cordon has secured or has attempted to secure for the Pacific Northwest. We do not have space to begin to touch on the long list of irrigation projects and rivers and harbors improvement projects which Cordon has secured for Oregon including such projects as Haystack Reservoir in Central Oregon, the Talent project in Southern Oregon, the Coos County and Lincoln County Harbor improvements and several Columbia river navigation improvements, and many, many others.
