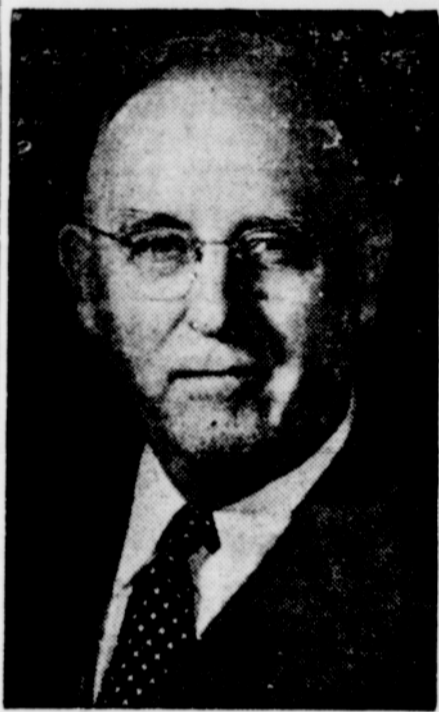

To The Citizens Of Brookings---

Many Brookings voters have inquired of me as how I feel on various local issues since I became a candidate for mayor. I have tried to answer them the best I could and would like to contact each and every one of you and discuss our various issues but that is impossible so I am taking this means of expressing myself.

I decided to become a candidate for mayor because I would like to have a greater part in helping promote the growth and betterment of our fast-growing, industrious city. I have watched with interest how Brookings has grown from a little hamlet when I came here in 1946 to its present size. Much has been done to improve Brookings since I came here and much more remains to be done.

I do not believe that any one person, mayor included, or any small group of individuals can build our city. We must have the cooperation of all of our citizens and we must work with our neighbors in our trading area to make Brookings a bigger and better city.

I feel that we should intensify our efforts to encourage more industry to come to Brookings to join the many fine plants that have come to our city in recent years. Much thought should be given to a diversified economy which I firmly believe is possible in this area. I have recently talked to people engaged in the manufacture of wood by-products who have expressed an interest in coming to this area, this I believe would be a fine example of diversifying our industry if plants of this nature could be induced to come to Brookings. Our Chamber of Commerce has done much to point out the advantages we have here and I feel that we should unite and redouble our efforts to get more industry to this area. We must decide as to what our goal should be in regard to a harbor and when we have an understanding on the local level present our objective to the proper authorities.

Much thought is being devoted to the construction of an adequate sewage distribution system. The method by which this is to be achieved will very likely be put to you as voters as soon as something concrete has been worked out. I do not believe that a satisfactory solution will be achieved in the near future with constant bickering.

It has come to my attention that the neighboring city of Gold Beach has recently made a successful transition from private ownership of their water supply to city ownership. I would like to study the merits of their transition as I feel that we might profit from their transition as I feel that we might profit by their experience.

In my years in the lumber industry I have personally supervised much road construction and maintenance. This does not mean that I am not open to advice on the maintenance

of our streets but I do feel that I have a definite objective in mind to improve the condition of our streets without increasing our maintenance costs. I am definitely against an extensive center strip paving project at this time. We must first put our roads in shape with proper grading and drainage and determine where additional water and sewer lines are to go so that we do not work undue hardship on taxpayers in the future.

In recent weeks false statements have been circulated that I favor a "wide-open" town and that vice will run rampant in Brookings if I am elected mayor. I know who some of the individuals are who are circulating these vicious falsehoods but I plished by lowering the level of the campaign do not believe that anything will be accomplished by a mud-slinging affair. I merely wish to state that these statements are utterly ridiculous.

I have promised no one a job in the city administration if I am elected mayor nor have I promised any of my supporters any favors. Should I be elected I will strive to keep all departments of our city government operating as efficiently, fairly, and economically as it is in my power to do.

I do not feel that we should contemplate additional parks in our city in the near future. We shall have too many other developments that we must spend our money on for a long time to come. We have two beautiful state parks in our city limits and I think that we should work toward obtaining additional recreational facilities in these parks, particularly in Azalea Park.

Additional recreation facilities should be developed in our city, particularly for our youngsters. This, however, cannot be accomplished by the city administration alone. Such activities should be promoted through the joint efforts of our churches, our school authorities, our civic organizations, the city authorities, and all of you as citizens of Brookings. I shall be happy to work with any interested individuals toward this goal whether or not I am elected mayor of Brookings in the coming election.

Neither my opponent or myself would be able to begin to solve the problems which will be continually facing us without the cooperation of at least a majority of our fellow citizens, and the cooperation of neighboring communities.

If you choose to elect me your mayor I promise that I will not be bound by "cronyism" or obligation to certain groups. I will strive at all times to abide by the wishes of the majority and to unselfishly do everything I can to make Brookings a bigger and increasingly better city in which to live.

If you believe as I do and feel that I can render you a service as your next mayor of Brookings I will greatly appreciate your support when you go to the polls on Nov. 2.
