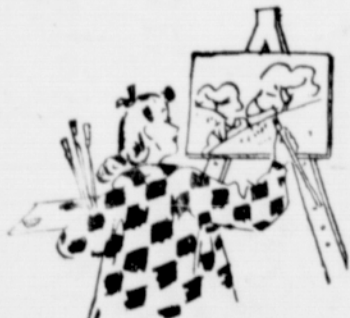
At 3:30 p. m. Friday Ervie Williams, president, Portland Union Stock Yards will talk, followed by introduction of special guests.

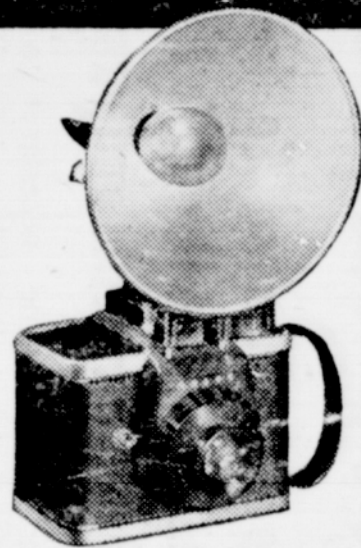
