## PROGRESS IN BROOKINGS-HARBOR TOLD AT CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

Progress in Brookings could have been the theme of the first fall meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, held last Thursday at the VFW hall.

Progress was reported, both in the past few months, and proposed progress on both the highway and the harbor were told.

Of major interest was E. L. Morton's report on the industrial affairs of the community. Morton is chairman of that committee. He reported a busy and prosperous summer for the lumber industry, and said that South Coast Lumber Co. Carson Moore and McKay Lmb. Co. all have done well. He said that the Brookings Plywood had a good summer, and told of a new Redwood fencing enterprise in the Harbor area. Morton also told of the sale of the Lake Pleasant mill to the Oregon-Washington Lmb. Co.

Morton stated that none of the industries here had been affected seriously by the lumber strikes, and have done well financially.

Discussing the current building in Brookings Morton reported that when the buildings now under construction are completed there will have been over \$1,000,000 worth of building here this year.

Also of extreme interest was a report by Charles Grayshel, who reported on the Harbor committee work. He said that progress is being made in regard to the property right of way, and said that it was to be hoped that there would be water transportation out of here next year.

Art Knox reported on the highway committee work. He discussed the meeting that he, along with Morton, and Chamber of Commerce president Earl Osterberg, had with the state highway commission. He stated that highway 101, will eventually be finished, and said it will be the only all year ice free highway in the state, and estimated that it would eventually carry between 35 and 40 per cent of all north-south traffic.

Clive Manley reported that the Chamber now had a membership of an even hundred members.

Chamber secretary Mrs. Geneva Bailey reported on the information booth, and stated that she is still hoping that names for a directory will come in.

William Tugman, editor of the Eugene Register-Guard, and chairman of the advisory committee to the travel information bureau of the state highway commission, was the main speaker for the evening. He told how \$125,000-000 worth of tourist dollars were spent in Oregon during the year.
