There will be movies for the children, and fun for everyone. Parents are asked to come and help their children's room win the room prize.

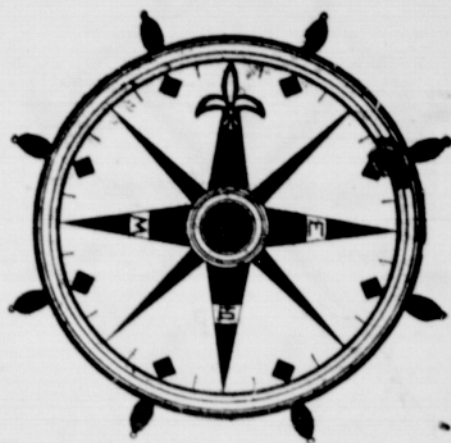

Everyone interested in the proposed Chetco Fire Protection District should attend the hearing to be held by the County Court at the Grange Hall Monday, November 22nd, at 8 p. m. This district takes in an area from the Chetco River to the State line and from the foothills to the ocean with a couple of large ranches in the Winihuck area left out by the requests of the owners.

Last spring the required signatures were secured to the petitions for such a Fire Protection District which a large percentage of landowners in the proposed district feel is very necessary. After the hearing, the county court will order an election to be held in the area at which time property owners who are legal voters may vote on whether such a district is wanted or not.

## POST OFFICE IN NEW BUILDING

The Post Office and the Pilot got moved into their new buildings this week with a minimum of difficulty and both places have begun "business as usual".

It took Sam Gott, and a crew of carpenters and workmen just Tuesday afternoon to tear down the existing partitions in the old Post Office, and begin setting them up in the new building, recently constructed by Henry Kerr.

The plaster and the paint on the new building wasn't dry, and people began picking up their mail Wednesday morning as usual.

All of the old boxes and other equipment were installed at the new Post Office on a temporary basis, with new equipment promised at a later date.

Workmen were still putting the finishing touches on the new building Wednesday, and a few Post Office patrons had to skip over ladders and the like to get to their boxes, in a new location. The hunt for the boxes wasn't a long process. Temporary hours at the Post Office is 8 a. m. to 5:30 p. m.

The Pilot machinery was moved on Saturday afternoon, and Sunday, with Sam Gott in charge of operations there. The exit was made through the rear basement door of the Central building. Most of the heavy machinery was picked up by a lift truck in a down-pour, and moved to the new building on a flat bed truck.
