### NEW POSITION

Mr. Wendell Bartholomew, formerly of Brookings Plywood has assumed his new position as superintendent for the Grants Pass Plywood.

The first meeting of the new Brookings council, directed by Mayor Roy Brimm, moved smoothly in its initial session. A lot of ground was covered.

Ralph W. "Pop" Reed was named building inspector, and street superintendent to replace O. D. Arp.

Pete Lesmeister was elected as president of the council, and head of the finance and insurance department.

Mayor Roy Brimm will head up the police and street departments.

Other business discussed and acted upon included a petition by Bill Martin of the Chetco Inn for approval of a club license to serve liquor to food customers.

There was a great deal of discussion on the request of Wilson Freeman and Bill Thompson, postmaster, for short time parking meters.

The council instructed city attorney Ed Ackley to draw up an ordinance making changes in the meter and parking ordinance, and gave Police Chief Bud Cross approval to make what changes in meters he deems necessary.

The planning commission also recommended a tie-in with the Plywood Corp. on fire signals, and suggested a fire phone be set in the plant where there would be a man on duty 24 hours a day.

Some discussion was held on the Green River ordinance, with the possibility of calling a special meeting on it at a later date.

Jim Kirby was appointed as judge pro-tem to succeed Luther Tisdale.

An application by the city for the state to pave Oak St., was turned down by the state highway commission.

Another letter to delinquent property owners on Hillside and Pacific was ordered sent out by Ackley, in an attempt to collect the some \$1,400 still owed the city on the paving.

One bid was in on insurance for the city, and that was accepted conditionally from Art Knox Insurance Agency.

The council meeting wound up on a lengthy discussion on the care and maintenance of the city street, with Reed giving a resume of what has been done during the past 11 days.

### TALK OF HOME MAIL DELIVERY

Brookings may have house to house mail delivery in the not too distant future, according to a talk by Post Master Bill Thompson at the Rotary Club meeting Tuesday noon.

Thompson said that the post office here has gone up a notch into a top second class division. He said that 300 boxes are on order to install in the new post office, but that the inspector would rather see street delivery than conjection in the post office.

It isn't necessary, according to Thompson, that sidewalks be paved for house to house delivery, because they can put in what they call a "mounted" route, when the post man would drive either a jeep or some type of carrier.

However, Thompson emphasized that house numbers must be up first, and then petitions made for the service. Then the government office in Portland would have to give its OK.

Funeral services will be held for Mabel E. Collis, 70, who died Wednesday at Seaside hospital in Crescent City. The services will be held on Saturday, at 2 p. m., at the Assembly of God Church in Brookings.

### Discuss Insurance At School Board

Insurance was discussed at a special meeting of the Brookings-Harbor school board on Monday night. There was some opposition over the awarding of the whole contract of the new school building to the Art-Knox Insurance Co., at an earlier meeting, and a special meeting was called by board chairman Virg Goldsberry to discuss the matter.

The board asked that the agencies work out a working agreement amongst themselves for future allocations.

There was no change on the original awarding of the new school insurance to the Knox Co.

The Knox Agency was asked to award sub-contracts to local agencies if he so wished, but said that he is under no obligation in that regard.
