Log Jams Removed In County

Log jam removal operations on Bald Mountain creek, an important spawning tributary of Elk river in Curry county, have been completed.

Walt Ryckman, field supervisor of stream clearance for the game commission, reports that the stream once again is open for the passage of migratory fish.

The Kerber Company of Langlois, under contract to the game commission, removed five impassable jams from this stream, a favorite spawning stream for salmon and steelhead. Two of the jams were located near the mouth effectively blocking off the entire stream system. Completion of the clearance work has made approximately 10 miles of main stream plus several miles of tributary water available for spawning.

Another logging concern, the Albertson Logging Company, cleared out Bear creek, a tributary of Bald Mountain.

Work will continue on the southwest coast to remove jams from other streams.

Tell Of Fir Production In State

Preliminary estimates of Douglas fir lumber production, orders and shipments for the twelve-months of 1954 were released today by Harris E. Smith, secretary, West Coast Lumberman's Association.

The weekly average of West Coast Lumber production in December was 192,721,000 b. f., or 100.2% of the 1949-1953 average. Orders averaged 209,232,000 b. f.; Shipments 195,738,000 b. f.; Weekly averages for November were: Production, 202,193,000 b. f.; 105.2% of the 1949-1954 average; Orders 185,749,000 b. f.; Shipments 194,446,000 b. f.

Twelve months of 1954 cumulative production 9,459,853,000 b.

"INSURANCE FACTS ON NEW HIGH SCHOOL"

In order to clarify the position of the undersigned in regards to the school insurance story which ran in last week's Pilot, we should like to present the following facts to the tax payers of School District 17-C

The detailed report is being presented to the tax-payers of School District 17-C, in the interest of fair and impartial treatment in the allocating Fire Insurance on public buildings; in particular, the Fire Insurance placement on the New High School building which is \$355,000.00. At the December 1954 meeting of the Board of Directors School District 17-C, which was a joint meeting with the Budget Committee, over various items in the budget.

During the course of the joint meeting some mention was made about Fire Insurance on the New High School. One member of the budget committee who is in the insurance business was present and was asked certain questions by directors of the school board. There is no record of the questions asked or answered in the minutes of the meeting, however, when the budget committee was excused the question about placing insurance was discussed and as a result a motion was made, seconded and carried that the Fire Insurance on the new high school be given to Knox Insurance Agency.

Mr. Knox is a member of the budget committee. This same agent was favored with the "Builder's Risk" while the building is under construction. There are five insurance agents in Brookings and four of these agents did not know that the School Board was going and take action at the December meeting about covering the new high school with fire protection. These four agents were able to secure a special meeting through one School director which was held on January 10, all agents being present. At this meeting each agent had an opportunity to state what his company could do and what we could jointly offer the school district.

After much discussion we were informed by the acting chairman that the School Board had entered into an agreement with the Knox agency and the acting chairman would not withdraw his motion and the director who seconded the motion would not change his vote either and concurred with the chairman.

One director who was absent at the previous meeting stated he would vote with the majority. We recommended that an Agent of Record be appointed by the School Board who in conjunction with the other agents in Brookings would work out an equitable division of the School Insurance to the end that the best coverage possible would be placed on the property at the most economical figure. But the school directors would not be prevailed upon to alter their first decision. The only answer we received was to work out a program for future insurance.
