**Obituary Given  
 For Mrs. Collis**

Mabel McCance, a talented  
 Brookings' citizen was laid at rest  
 in the Ward Memorial Cemetery,  
 Saturday afternoon, January 15.  
 Mrs. Collis came here in 1949  
 when she and her husband pur-  
 chased extensive ocean front  
 property and built a house. There-  
 after this was known as the  
 Fountain Rock addition because  
 of the scenic view upon which  
 their home looked.

Mabel Collis was a member of  
 the Azalea Garden Club. She was  
 an able and ardent gardener, a  
 hobby she pursued to the limit  
 of her strength. She attended  
 the Presbyterian Church.  
 She was active in musical cir-  
 cles here, giving generously of  
 her talent as a musician, having  
 served as accompanist to the  
 Chetco Choral Group and the  
 Presbyterian Choir. However, so  
 modest and unassuming was this  
 accomplished woman, that few  
 were aware that she had been a  
 talented concert pianist, accom-  
 panist and a contralto soloist.  
 Mabel Collis composed charming  
 children's songs, and one song  
 especially for the Azalea Garden  
 Club. She also composed music  
 built about certain aspects of  
 nature—the ocean waves, or a  
 storm, and some flower in her  
 garden.

Mabel McCance Collis was  
 born in Pomeroy, Washington on  
 January 10, 1885. Her family  
 were pioneers of Garfield County.  
 Mrs. Collis attended Southern  
 Oregon College, and Whitman  
 College at Walla Walla. She was a  
 graduate of the conservatory of  
 music of Whitman College.

She married William J. Col-  
 lis in Salt Lake City in 1914 and  
 spent most of her married life in  
 Camas County, Idaho. As a pro-  
 fessional musician, she continued  
 to teach and work as an accom-  
 panist after her marriage.

Prior to coming here, Mr. and  
 Mrs. Collis resided in Ashland  
 for four years.

Surviving her are her husband  
 and four children: Mrs. Margaret  
 Smith of Sacramento; Mrs. Is-  
 abel Steed, Riverside, California,  
 Sam Collis of Dayton, Ohio and  
 Lt. James E. Collis of Pensacola,  
 Florida.

She leaves ten grandchildren.  
 Also surviving her are a sister,  
 Mrs. Hugh Gormley of Yucaipa,  
 California, and two brothers,  
 Delbert McCance of North Pow-  
 der, Oregon and Edison McCance  
 of La Grande.

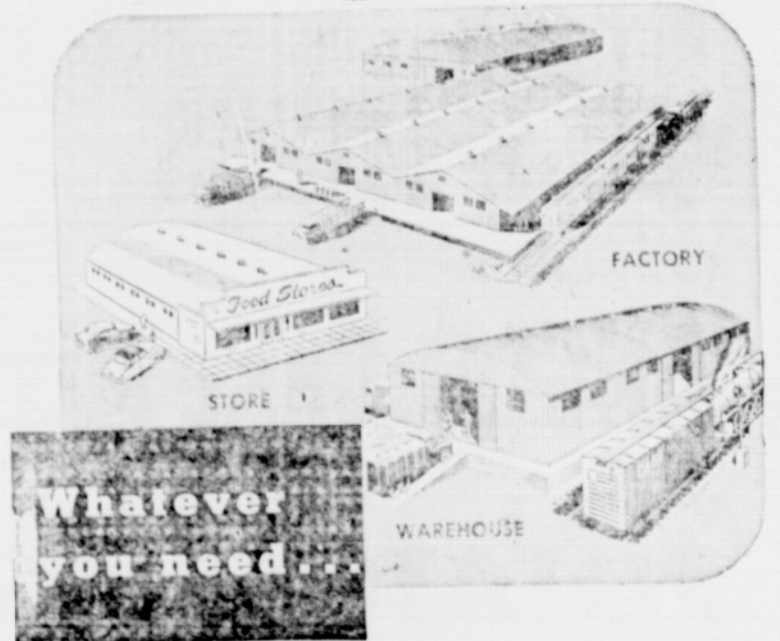
