Grangers Protest Columbia Interstate Compact For Northwest Pacific States

Unanimous opposition to a proposed Columbia Interstate compact for seven Pacific Northwest states was voiced by some 175 Grangers meeting at State Grange headquarters in Portland, January 17. Thirty-four of Oregon's 36 counties were represented at the meeting.

Those present also adopted a resolution urging the federal government to begin construction of the John Day dam and continue on schedule its construction of The Dalles, McNary and Chief Joseph dams. Another resolution urged congress to authorize construction of a high federal dam at the Hells Canyon site.

The meeting was called by State Master Elmer McClure for the purpose of reviewing the present status of the public power program in Oregon, with particular reference to the Columbia Interstate compact and its effect on the program.

The discussion of the compact was led by State Senator Robert D. Holmes and State Representative Alfred H. Corbett. Holmes, who was a member of the Oregon delegation which helped draw up the proposed compact but who refused to sign it in the final form, pointed out that the original purpose of the compact proposal was to "throw a roadblock in the path of a Columbia Valley authority". The final document, he said, if ratified by the legislatures of the seven states involved, could work to the serious disadvantage of Oregon as far as allocation of

power is concerned. Representative Corbett pointed out that under the compact, states in which dams are located would be given a prior right to all of the prime power generated by such a dam, plus a prior to all prime power generated by reason of downstream benefits of such a dam. The compact would give upstream users prior right to all consumptive uses of water.

Other speakers at the meeting included Albert Ullman, president of the National Hells Canyon association, who detailed the present status of the Hells Canyon controversy, and Gus Norwood, secretary-manager of the Northwest Public Power association, who urged that Oregon's laws relating to people's utility districts be amended to make them more workable.

Brookings To Get \$655 Back On Liquor Refund

Licensing operations of the Oregon Liquor control commission for 1954 resulted in allocation this month of 601,655.50 to cities, counties and the general fund of the state. The commission reports that warrants, totaling \$300,093.90, representing 60 percent of license fees collected, are being allotted to localities. Curry county will receive \$1,230.06; Gold Beach

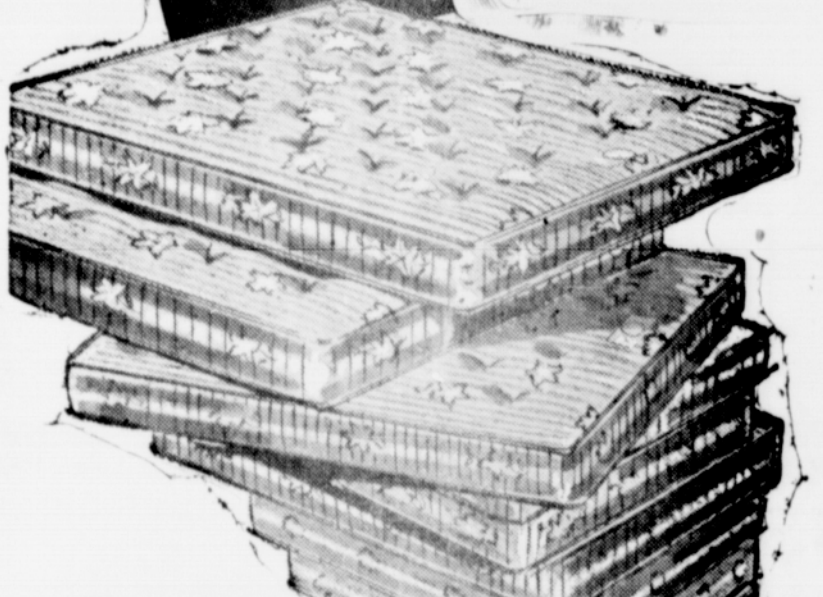
\$801.54; Port Orford \$426.97; and Brookings \$655.11.

Forty percent of the earned license revenue, or \$240,062.60, is being channeled to the general fund, plus revenue from out of state licenses and sale of lists, bringing the total distribution to the general fund to \$241,571.60.

Distributions are made in accordance with the liquor control act which specifies that 60 percent of license fees return to the locality in which the licensed outlet is located, and remainder go to the general fund.

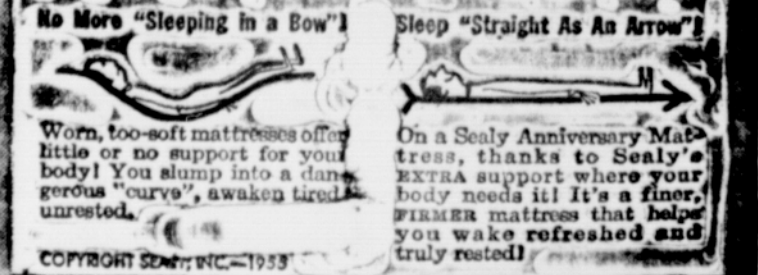
