Chevies, Fords, Buicks Lead In New Car Sales

New car sales in Curry county, as listed by the Oregon Motor Register, showed some interesting figures. In the county through November, 1954, Chevrolets lead the way with 102 sold, with Ford right behind with 68. Buick is a surprising third in the county sales with 33, followed by Oldsmobile, 32, Plymouth 18, and Dodge 18.

Throughout Oregon in general, for the year, Ford is leading by a slight margin over Chevrolet, 11813, to 11336, with Buick still third with 4071. Oldsmobile with 3851, Plymouth, and then Mercury, Nash, and Dodge in that order.

In Curry county 345 new cars had been sold through November.

Funds Set Up For Cooperative Improvement

Funds for Bonneville power line improvements, to the Coos-Curry Electric Cooperative, and through Cooperative facilities at Brookings are included in President Eisenhower's Bonneville Power administration budget for fiscal year beginning July 1, 1955.

Included are funds for an interconnection with the California-Oregon Power Company at Reston. The network improvements will augment existing power supply to the Pacific Power and Light Company's Coos Bay system, to Coos-Curry Electric Cooperative at Norway, Bandon, Port Orford, Gold Beach and Brookings.

The overall BPA budget request of \$16,456,000 for construction funds would be augmented with \$10,181,000 carry over from previous appropriations.

Post Office May Use Greyhound As Mail Carrier

The Post Office Department, after months of careful planning and legal footwork, has made an area-type contract with Pacific Greyhound Lines, bus common carrier, along lines suggested by highway common carriers of property.

On January 1 this year Pacific Greyhound agreement replaced about 35 separate Star Route contracts the bus company had for carrying mail at pay of about \$100,000 a year.

First such area type contract, the agreement sets a flat rate per piece (sack) for handling mail by the bus company anywhere on its system in California, Arizona, Nevada, Utah and Oregon.

Cuts red tape, too. A phone call from the District Superintendent, Postal transportation service, notifies the carrier when to begin operation, amount of mail, and points to be served on his lines. No time is lost; no conferences held; the rate is already agreed upon.
