## BROOKINGS BRUINS DEFEAT GOLD BEACH HERE 68-61

The Brookings Bruins nailed a 68-61 loss to the Gold Beach Panthers here Wednesday night, in a close hard fought game.

Fouls, and a well balanced Brookings scoring hurt Gold Beach, as four of their first five fouled out of the contest.

Four Bruins finished in the double figure column in scoring, with Ken Russell netting 22 points before he fouled out. Jerry Anderson made his biggest point tally of the season, collecting 17 points. Frank Fudling, and Stan Gribble each contributing 13 counters to the cause.

For Gold Beach the scoring was more spread out, with the exception of Meyer, and Allard, who hit the hoop for 20 and 13 points respectively.

Brookings and Gold Beach both started out in a rash of points, each hitting 20 in the first quarter, but the Bruins managed a 3 point lead at half time, 34-31. Brookings pulled away another two points at the three quarter mark, 55-50.

The Gold Beach junior varsity team handed Brookings a 52-42 defeat, the same margin as Brookings lost to in Gold Beach earlier. Gold Beach took an early 22-7 lead and coasted home.
