much shall actually be spent and for what? The procedure is similar to what might happen if you were to make a deal with a man to repair and renovate your home and keep it in good condition for a year. You would probably ask him to give you an itemized list of what he will do and what it will cost. You would then take the list, make some reductions in it and perhaps a few increases, total it up and then hand the man the revised bill and the money and tell him to go ahead! That is what Congress does with the budget.

Of special interest to all of the people of our Fourth Congressional district is the Budget which mentions the Green Peter dam on the South Santiam and Cougar dam on the McKenzie. Although these flood control projects are of vital interest to the farmers downstream from the dams, all of us will benefit from more than 100,000 kilowatts of power that will be fed into the lines of the Northwest Power Pool from the generators of those dams. Here is the paragraph from the Budget:

"There is included in the budget for the fiscal year 1956 a supplement appropriation of \$10,000,000 to provide for the federal share, in cooperation with states, local governments, or private water resources projects. Of the total provided, \$5,000,000 is proposed for application as follows: Cougar reservoir, Ore., \$2,000,000; Green Peter reservoir, Ore., (including White Bridge reservoir), \$1,000,000.

In other words the President will not approve of the expenditure of money on either of these vital projects unless they are built under the new partnership plan. (The House appropriations committee expressed the same view last year).

In view of the fact that there is local money available for both of these projects I think the administration is on sound ground in saying that such money should be used rather than increase the federal deficit. The statement that the Federal Government would be "giving away" the revenue part of such dams is an untruth. The

LETTER FROM WASHINGTON

The President's budget which was sent to Congress recently is still a subject of considerable discussion here. It is also a document that is, or at least should be, of considerable interest to the people of Oregon.

The annual budget is the President's statement of the amount of money he thinks should be appropriated to run the government for a year. In addition to the items for operating expenses, requests are made for public works and development. In other words, there is listed in the big budget book the details of all of the money the Executive branch of our government thinks it should spend during the next fiscal year.

The budget is simply a request for money. Congress looks over the requests and decides how

government receives no revenue or "profits" from such projects. It merely receives back into the treasury over a period of 50 years the money it borrows and uses to build the dams. Under the partnership plan, the government actually does make a little money because the local partner is required to pay a part of the cost of the flood control function of the project.

I intend to again introduce the Cougar and Green Peter partnership bills in the House. The House passed the Cougar bill last year. I believe the partnership principle is favored by the House and that it will pass both of these bills.
