Any Book Can Be Borrowed Through Library

Oregonians have a privileged almost unequalled in any other state; that of being able to borrow from the Oregon State Library, the bare cost of postage, book rate, and assuming the obligation of seeing that the volumes or volume is returned on time.

Through this local service access is made to many volumes the average person could not afford. So far this month, books have been asked for by local people on printing techniques, specialized floriculture and ceramics.

All that is necessary is for the prospective borrower call at the library and either give in the titles of volumes wanted or specify the topic in which they are interested. Request slips are filled out for forwarding to the state librarian. When the books come they are sent direct to the library, he borrower direct so they can be picked up and, as above, the borrower assumes the carrying charges, usually amounting to a few cents. The local librarian acts as an agent of the State Library until the books are actually returned to Salem.

This system applies to almost everything in print, whether books or periodicals.
