

Oregon Bond Sales Set New Records

While 1954 marked record sales for Treasury Savings Bonds, January purchases indicate further growth in popularity among Oregon investors.

During January Oregon residents put \$5,481,659 worth of U. S. Savings Bonds in their thrift socks, according to an announcement today by County Chairman C. M. Gray, Ophir.

This is 52 per cent more than were purchased in the same month last year and makes January of 1955 the highest in Savings Bonds sales since December, 1945.

The H Bond, latest in the series of Savings Bonds offered to investors by the Treasury Department, is continuing its climb in the preferred list of risk-free investments. During January of this year \$1,438,000 were sold in the state. This is the largest amount for any month since the H bond was put on the market in May of 1952.

"County residents continued their support of Savings Bonds by purchasing \$12,109 during January as part of their 1955 thrift program," County Chairman Gray said.

Nationally, \$573 million were invested in Savings Bonds as compared with \$485 million for January of 1954. This is an average increase of 18 percent for the 48 states. Cash sales in the nation exceeded every single month's since January of 1946 and the cash value of E and H Bonds outstanding reached an all-time high of \$38,515 million.
