### ACCIDENT HERE INJURES YOUTH

A serious accident hospitalized one youth, and totally wrecked a car here Sunday night. Hurt was Robbie Dimmick, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Dimmick. Robbie was taken to the Crescent City hospital and was in considerable pain for several days. He suffered a broken arm, groin injuries, and other cuts and bruises in the accident, but is getting along better and may leave the hospital this week-end.

The car, a V-8 Commander Studebaker, was driven by Douglas Hammes, a sophomore at Brookings high school. The accident happened at about 7:30 Sunday evening, just north of Brookings.

Hammes swerved to avoid an animal in the road, and lost control of the vehicle. It slipped on feet and then rolled sideways for another 76 feet, rolling over four times. The distance from the start of the skid to the stopping point was 172 feet. The car suffered extensive damage to the top and door on passenger side, the rear axle was broken.

Dimmick was thrown out of the passenger side on the first roll of the car, and was found laying across the yellow line in the road.

## North Gate To Have Opening

Brookings newest building will have its grand opening Saturday, Feb. 19, with several of the merchants tying in for a one day promotion.

Occupying the structure will be an insurance agency, the Art Knox Agency; A bakery, Vern's Pastry; a Feed and Seed Store, Brookings Feed and Seed; an engineer, Art Sherman; and an accountant, Ray Gregory.

The building was built by the Brookings Building Co. with Fell Campbell as general contractor and builder. It was designed by a Los Angeles firm.

It is modern in appearance, with recessed fronts, shadow windows with spotlighting effect. Painted a green, with a rust front, the building was made out of shale block, with re-inforced steel and concrete. It has concrete floors throughout. The building contains some 8,000 square feet, with two 40 foot store, a 20 foot all with a depth of 65 feet. In addition the building has three smaller office quarters.



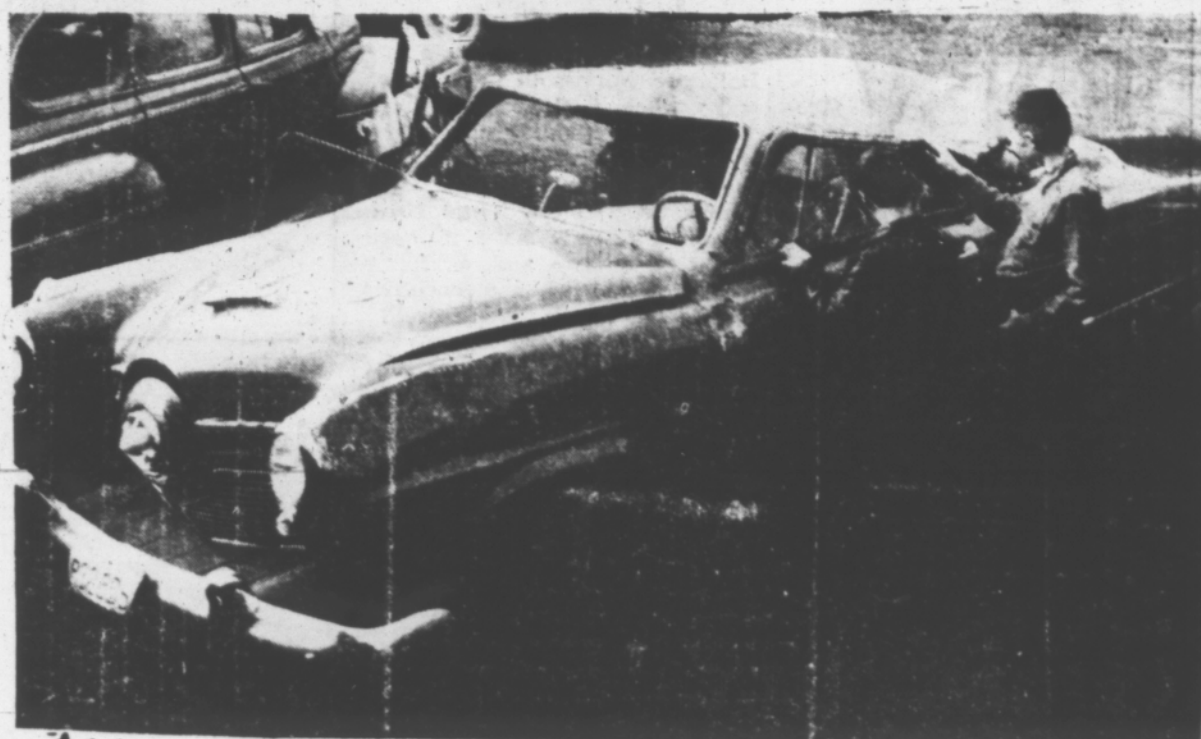
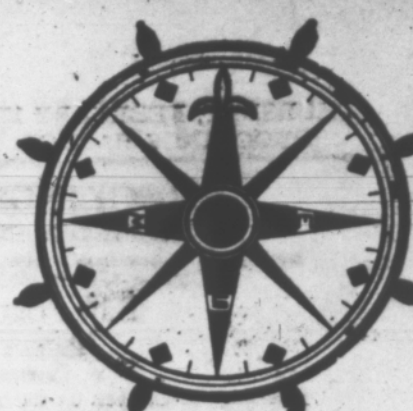

### LENTEEN SERVICE ANNOUNCED

A series of special services to be held at 8 p.m. on the first six Fridays of Lent beginning February 25, has been announced by the Rev. John R. Shideler, vicar of St. Timothy's Episcopal Church, corner Fir Street and Azalea Park Road.

These services will feature some special music and a series of addresses under the general title "By the Word of God," in which God's never ending search for man will be reviewed. The public is cordially invited.

Titles of the individual addresses are: "In the beginning, God," "Knowing good and evil," "I will bless thee," "Woe to the rebellious children," "The form of a servant," and "The fellowship of the mystery."

The first three Friday evenings after Easter will be devoted to preparing candidates for Holy Confirmation, which is the completion and ratification of Christian Baptism. All persons wishing to be received into the communion of the world wide Episcopal Church should be faithful in attendance at the Lenten series and special study classes held after Easter, which will supplement the instruction given during Lent.

### O.E.S. Entertains At Regular Session

The O.E.S. entertained the Mason at the I.O.O.F. hall Tuesday night. It was the regular meeting date of the group, and a program of a Patriotic nature was held. A poem honoring George Washington was read, and a skit was presented.

### SOIL REPORT IS RELEASED

An annual report of the Curry County Soil Conservation district was released recently by officers of that group. Members of the Board of Supervisors are Cecil Watt, Chairman; Ray Zumwalt, Vice Chairman; Clarence Brooks, secretary; Ollie Ferguson, and Harvey Crook.

Ex-officio member is Kenneth Priest, Extension Agent; assistants are Archie McVay, John Donaldson, Bud Brown, Otis Bowman, and Wilber Ostrand.

The report covered the second years work of the district, which draws to a close on April 30th.

During the first 11 months of this year, the report read, 40,420 acres of land has been surveyed and typed, as to soil. Sixty three farm plans have been written, and many individual drainage, irrigation, and crop plans have been developed. Free information has been advanced to all those seeking it. Other problems such as erosion, forestry, grass land management, wild life, crops, livestock, specialty crops, evergreen harvest, forest tree farming, flood control, and water conservation have received consideration.

The district sponsored a booth at the Curry County fair.

General information released by the report says: The farmer of today must be well informed on all problems confronting the average farmer if he is to remain a farm supported farmer. Those who are energetic and willing to take advantage of all opportunities offered, and to apply the knowledge they gain, opportunity awaits them for success.

This district, the report goes on, is blessed with a large amount of rainfall and affords a liberal amount of pasture, which makes it favorable for livestock, especially sheep raising. The district also contains some of the world's finest Dairy cows.

The cool coastal breezes in summer and heavy rains in winter hold the temperature at points especially suitable for Easter Lily and Bulb production. There is much soil suitable for cranberry production which is idle, offering opportunity to both the young and older alike.

The city of Brookings has accepted a proposed sewer survey by the engineering firm of Cornell, Howell, Hayes and Ferryfield, of Corvallis, at a cost to the city not to exceed \$50.

The consulting engineering firm sent a letter to the city, and Mayor Roy Brimm stating what the engineers would do, and stated that the cost would not exceed the \$50 rate.

In the city's letter of reply, accepting the proposal, the firm was asked to expedite the surveying work.

The proposed plan of survey follows:

1. On the basis of available planimetric and topographic information, develop a preliminary design for sanitary sewers for the presently platted areas within the city limits of Brookings, taking into consideration the existing sewer system.
2. On the basis of this preliminary design, evaluate the sewer system.
3. Prepare a map showing size and location of proposed sewers.
4. Determine the requirements of the Oregon State Sanitary Authority and Oregon State Board of health for sewer treatment.
5. Determine the most economical and satisfactory site for a sewerage treatment plant.
6. Prepare cost estimates of proposed sewers and sewerage treatment facilities.
7. Develop a method of financing sewers proposed for immediate construction and a fiscal program for future sewer extension, and sewer plant construction.

Heading the demonstrations will be Dorothy Sherrill, consumer education specialist, John Landers, animal husbandry specialist, and Clifford L. Smith, Agricultural serviceman, all from Oregon State.

The general public is invited, in an endeavor to acquaint the women especially with the proper techniques of cutting, wrapping and identifying meat cuts.

By mailtime Wednesday Curry County was to be richer by some \$57,217, according to information received here. The money was the long disputed, and long awaited Oregon & California (O&C) land grant money.

Checks totaling \$5,171,623 were mailed out Tuesday to 18 counties in Oregon, as a result of the settlement of the 39 year old dispute.

Payment of the money was authorized by the Cordon-Ellsworth act of 1914. The act provided that 75 per cent of the money impounded from year to year should be distributed to the counties and 25 per cent to the federal government.

Secretary of Interior Douglas McKay announced the payment, and said that some of the money, \$800,000 is being impounded in a special fund to cover possible losses because of litigation pending in federal court.

The biggest payment went to Douglas county with \$1,311,523 given them.

Curry County Clerk, Mrs. Oleta Walker, reported that the money was not allocated in this year's budget, and could not be spent until after the budget is approved.
