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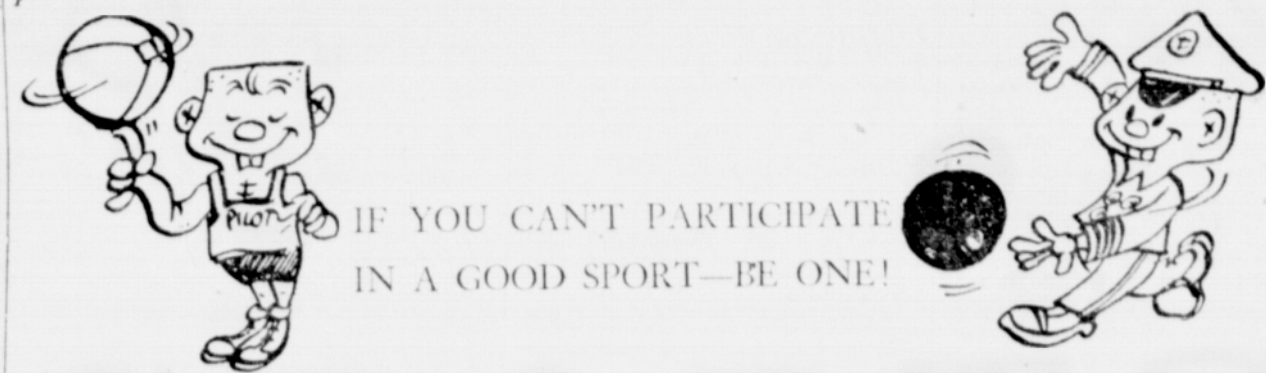
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BASEBALL MEETING PLANNED HERE

While spring time weather has prevailed during the past few weeks, the baseball season is still almost three months away. However the Southern Oregon league called a baseball meeting at Roseburg last Sunday.

Pete Lesmeister, business manager of the Brookings Beavers, attended the session and reports a "good deal of early interest in the league for the coming season. Drain, Coquille, Medford, Grants Pass and Brookings were members of the five team league last year but an effort is being made to increase the league to eight clubs. Bandon, after an absence of one year, was voted back into the league, as was Bend which was represented for the first time. The travel distance to Bend was considered quite a handicap, however that city's application received favorable action. Other possible entries to make the 8th club are Roseburg and Glendale.

Another league meeting has been scheduled at Roseburg on March 6th. The Brookings Baseball association and interested fans must decide in the meantime if they will back the local team this season. Floyd Swearington, president of the association, is calling a meeting for Friday night, March 4th, in Lesmeister's office. Last year's club while winding up in 3rd place in the league standings, ended in the red financially. Lesmeister mentioned further that it will take approximately \$1200 or more in the way of support from the merchants and fans. From the latter possibly in the way of season tickets. A good representative team can be fielded. All that is needed is some money and work on the present field, which the league president termed a "cow pasture" at last Sunday's meeting.

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
