**MILEAGE IS UP IN STATE**

Oregon motor vehicle travel climbed approximately 10 percent in January to set a new all-time high for that month, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry reported Friday.  
Total street and highway mileage, estimated from statewide gasoline sales figures, exceed 467 million as compared with 425 million miles in January of 1954.  
January traffic deaths also increased, Newberry said. The toll was 27 killed as against 22 during the same month a year ago.  
This pegged the months mileage death rate at 5.8, up seven tenths of a point from the 5.1 recorded at the same time last year. The death rate indicates the number of persons killed in each 100 million miles of aggregate driving, officials explained.  
Gasoline sales totalled 40,636,546 gallons, an increase of more than three 500 thousand gallons over sales of the preceding January. Total mileage is estimated by applying an average miles-per-gallon figure obtained from the federal Public Roads Administrator.

Uniformity in housing isn't a desirable asset to any community. If each and every house in the proposed project looks like each other, the community appearance isn't bettered.

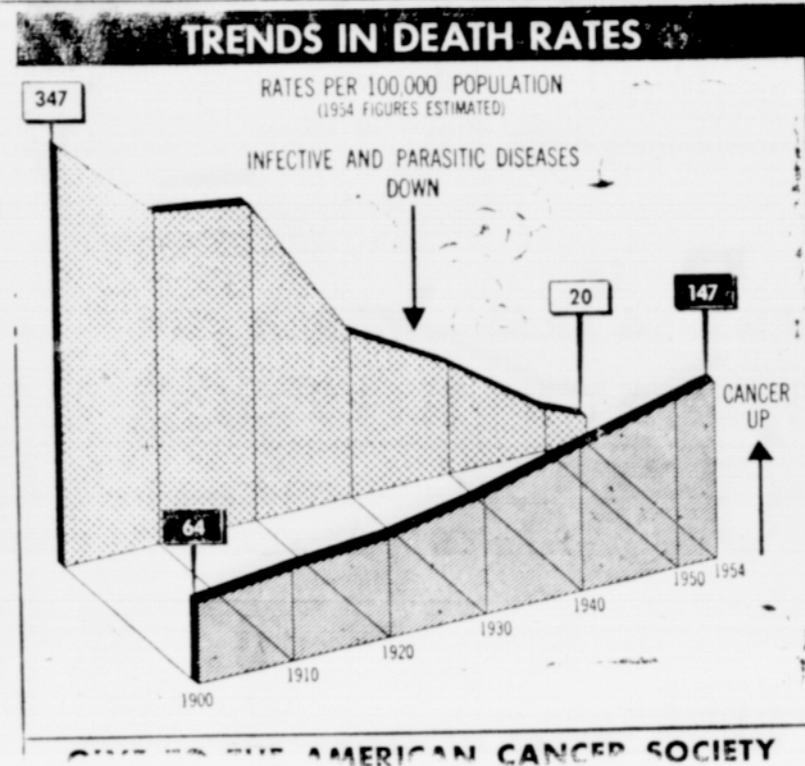
