ECONOMY RUN

If each motorist in Curry County increased his gasoline mileage only one mile per gallon a county wide saving of 204,891 gallons would result in a single year, according to Grady H. Younce, distributor for General Petroleum Corporation.

He said techniques for such gasoline savings will be demonstrated by drivers in the 1955 Mobilgas Economy Run which begins March 14.

Twenty-two automobiles, the cream of America's new crop of passenger cars, will compete in the Economy Run over a tortuous 1323-mile course from Los Angeles to the base of Pike's Peak, Colorado Springs, Colorado.

Each of these cars will be seeking the sweepstakes award for the highest ton-miles-per-gallon average on the course, as well as class awards.

436 MOTORIST
LOSE LICENSES

Traffic law violations cost 436 Oregon motorists their licenses to drive last month, Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry's office has reported.

Licenses suspension followed court convictions for serious traffic offenses in 333 cases, including drunk driving, hit and run, and driving on a previously suspended or revoked license. Conviction on these charges makes suspension mandatory under Oregon law, officials pointed out.

An additional 98 drivers were suspended by discretionary action of the department, 58 of whom were grounded for failure to report accidents. Thirteen drivers with records of repeated accidents or traffic convictions also received suspensions during the month.

U. S. Plywood Buys
Land In Curry

The United State Plywood Corporation has completed the purchase of the Associated Plywood Mills, Inc. including timber holdings of approximately 500 million board feet of timber covering approximately 26,000 acres of land, owned by Lloyd Corporation, located in the Gold Beach area.

The timber included in the sale lies on the south side of the Rogue River. Plans were originally made to put in a sawmill and green peeler operation in Gold Beach, with the sawmill to have a daily minimum capacity of 35,000 board feet. However, nothing further on the plans were announced.
