FOR WHAT IT'S WORTH

Anyone who knows anything at all is well aware of the fact that just because an individual is employed in a bank is no guarantee that he lights his cigarette with a twenty dollar bill. It is equally true that just because a man works for the federal government is no surety that he wallows in the tax-fed public trough.

Salaries of postal employees may be used as an example. Whereas the laborer may negotiate through his union to insure his being paid a wage in line with current cost of living such is not the case with the man who works for Uncle Sam. Post office employees, being on civil service, must look to Congress for salary increases; and Congress is not noted for its generosity when it comes to paying their hired help.

A recent attempt to raise salaries of mail carriers was vetoed by President Eisenhower who based his action on the fact that the proposal failed to provide the funds necessary for the increase. Congress, well aware that the President would be forced to take such action, based its opposition on the premise that with the postal service already operating in the red, it would be ridiculous to increase the deficit by raising wages.

This leaves with us the shocking conclusion that a government employee in a division which is losing money must sacrifice all rights to the decent wage enjoyed by his neighbor who is hired by private enterprise. Such thinking on the part of Congress could well be employed as exhibit A in the argument against federal control as opposed to private enterprise.

I have not noted any reluctance, however, on the part of Congressmen to increase their own salaries by fifty percent. Neither have I seen any information advanced as to where the money is coming from to take care of this increase in national expenditure.

If president Eisenhower were to be consistent, he would veto this bit of legislation; but I can hardly imagine a president, desirous of cooperation from Congress, turning down their bid for more lucre. It seems though that Congress, now that it has lined its own pockets might consider the plight of their employees who are not in a position to bring comparable pressure to bear.
