The Brookings-Harbor school district, and the Brookings-Harbor P.T.A. have sent letters to the Curry County court, requesting that the recently received \$157,000 O & C Lumber funds be distributed to three county schools. The P.T.A. letter recommended that the "first payment of O & C, plus other funds available for a courthouse be used for that purpose, and that the last payment be equally distributed between county roads and county schools, with payment to the schools being allocated on the basis of average membership in the various schools of the county.

SAVING BONDS SALES ARE UP

Sales of U.S. Savings Bonds continued their steady climb as a favored investment by Oregonians, who purchased \$3,655,726 worth of them in February.

"This is three times higher than sales in February, 1954 which was regarded as an excellent month," said the County Chairman in announcing this county's sales of \$21,697 worth of E and H Bonds.

"February sales for Oregon a year ago amounted to \$3,100,936. The steady increase of sales of Savings Bonds in the state reflects how strongly this type of risk-free investment appeals to those who value guaranteed savings. Sales for the first two months of 1955 are ahead of those of 1954 in counties."

The County Chairman said that on the national scene, the biggest cash sales of Savings Bonds in ten years reflects Oregon's record, with the excess of sales redemptions being higher than at any time during the past six years.
