This delicious seafood and rice casserole was made especially for packaged pre-cooked rice. A real quick-easy dish—it's made in two steps. First, bring the liquid ingredients to a boil; add the fish and peas and a five-ounce box of Minute Rice—right from the box! Top this with fish and pop into the oven, and in twenty minutes it's cooked, ready to serve and absolutely delicious. Here's a Lenten suggestion you'll make all year long.

Seafood Supreme

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| 1 can condensed cream of mushroom soup | 1 1/2 cups (5-ounce package) Minute Rice |
| 1 1/4 cups water or milk | 1 can salmon or tuna or shrimp |
| 1/4 cup finely chopped onion | 1 box frozen peas, thawed |
| 1 teaspoon lemon juice | 1/2 cup grated Cheddar cheese |
| 1/4 teaspoon salt | Paprika |
| Dash of pepper | |

Mix soup, water, onion, lemon juice, salt, and pepper in a saucepan. Bring to a boil over medium heat; stir occasionally. Pour about half the soup mixture into a greased 1 1/2-quart casserole. Then in layers, add the packaged pre-cooked rice (right from the box), sea food, and peas. Add remaining soup, top with cheese, sprinkle with paprika. Cover. Bake in moderate oven (375°F.) 20 minutes. Serves 4 or 5.

Note: For variety use celery soup instead of the mushroom and if you like, you can omit one or all of these: the onion, the lemon juice, the peas.

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
