

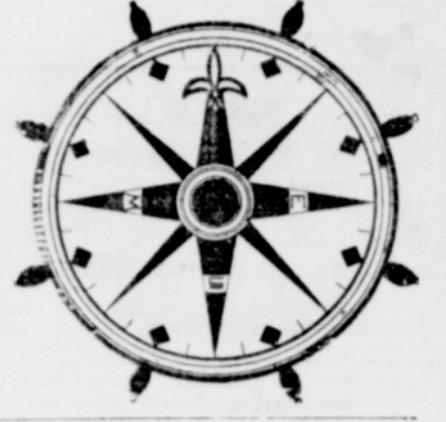

## U.S. NATIONAL REPORTS 15% DEPOSIT INCREASE

With more than 15 per cent increase in deposits during the past 12-month period, the United States National bank reported deposits totaling \$746,670,830 on April 11.

Deposits for the Brookings branch now stand at \$3,914,138.84. E. L. Morton, manager, stated.

Indicative of U.S. National's financing service to the state, total loans and discounts during the same 12-month period increased \$36,541,951 and now aggregate \$277,849,699.

The Brookings branch shows a loans and discounts total of \$1,842,994.29.

## REPORT GIVEN ON SEWERS

An engineer from the Corvallis firm of Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merryfield, gave the city a lengthy report on the recent sewer survey, conducted by that firm recently.

The report gave four recommendations to the city group attending the session Friday night. Attending were the planning commission, the council, the citizens committee, and the budget committee, along with Elmer Bankus, and other interested people.

Recommendations made to the city were: 1. Find out the status of the current sewer system. 2. Establish a sinking fund at once to begin setting aside money for a complete sewer survey. 3. Conduct a complete sewer survey. 4. Vote and sell a bond issue to begin work on the system.

The engineer said that it was the firm's belief that the present system is worth about \$29,000, making into account what it would cost to replace it.

The report showed maps of the city, and what areas recommended to be served by a new system. It also showed a tentative sewer disposal plant on Chetco Point which the state deems necessary.

## 472 DEER ARE BAGGED IN CURRY

A record deer kill was recorded in Oregon this year, with 112,846 deer taken in 1954, according to the Oregon Game Commission. With 54.7 percent of the 215,047 hunters being successful in getting their venison.

Klamath county led the list with the most deer hunters and the largest number of deer. Even Multnomah county came through with 85 deer for 366 hunters. Wallowa county had 78.6 per cent success for its hunters.

Curry county had 1,042 hunters and had 472 kills reported for a 45.3 percentage.

A total of 5,038 elk were taken by 27,358 elk hunters for a success ratio of 18.8 percent. Surprisingly Curry county had 22 hunters and netted one elk, for a 4.5 success percentage. Most of the elk were taken in Clatsop county, where 4,960 hunters picked off 110 bulls and 599 cows and 166 elk.

### REPORT 101 TO COST \$400,000 FOR EACH MILE

A delegation of Curry County citizens, including Mayor Roy Brimm and Ed Dempsey of Brookings, and the Curry County court stormed the citadel of the state highway commission in Portland last Thursday to protest the possible abandonment of the improvement along highway 101.

However the group received little encouragement or support from the highway commission, but neither did that body say that there was anything to the rumors that the project was going to be abandoned.

Vern Ayers, manager of the Oregon Coast Association was also at the meeting and told the commission that he had heard reports that the Gold Beach-Brookings highway project had been dropped.

Chairman Ben Chandler said that was not true. He said the section from Pistol River to Brookings won't be possible for some time since it will be along the beach and will cost an estimated \$400,000 a mile for 15 miles.

As for the section from Gold Beach to Pistol River, Chandler said the commission won't reach a definite decision until a complete survey is finished.

An inquiry about the extent of gambling in Brookings was held before the grand jury at Gold Beach on Wednesday, April 20th. Samuel Hall, Curry county district attorney called several citizens from Brookings to offer information, if any, about the gambling situation. Mr. Hall stated, "Time and again enforcement officers have given warning against gambling. Undercurrents, expressions, and complaining indicate that these warnings are to some degree going unheeded."

Brookings citizens called before the grand jury were: Bud Pisarek, Bob Dimmick, Charles Grayshel, Ed Dempsey, Warren Smith, Bud Cross, Roy Brimm, G.O. Blunt, Louie Stoller, L. Micholczyk. Many of these serve the community in some official capacity, or been closely associated with civic interest and the District Attorney office felt they could offer some constructive criticism and possibly advice on the matter. As Mr. Hall put it, "I have called as witnesses a lot of good people with the purpose that they can be of help to the enforcement officers."

The investigation was being conducted on a county-wide basis, with citizens of other areas in Curry County also being called in to testify before the Grand Jury.
