It isn't only Brookings, either. The situation is general across the nation—and therefore something must be wrong with our school systems.

Of course, it isn't wrong for teachers or anybody else to seek improvement, either in their education, or in seeking a better position.

We don't know the answer. Certainly, it is partially explained in Brookings, where it would naturally be difficult to keep the young unmarried teacher because of the remoteness of the big city.

We are inclined to believe that the answer lies in salary, although it has improved in recent years. Perhaps working conditions in a school have something to do with the constant searching for something better.

TELL OF GAINS IN CANCER FIGHT

April has been proclaimed Cancer Control Month by President Eisenhower. To combat this insidious disease, the American Cancer Society is spearheading a three-fold attack to conquer cancer through a program of research education and service to patients.

The exception is lung cancer which claimed 24,000 lives in the United States last year, 20,000 among men. In five other major areas the disease is leveling off in both statistics and there have been sizeable gains against uterine cancer.

It is also expected that the attack against cancer of the breast will soon be reflected in dropping death rates. The key to this effort is self-examination.

Only about 5 per cent of all lung cancers are cured today, but with early detection and treatment this could be changed to at least 50 per cent.

Specifically, protection from over-exposure to sun and wind, prompt repair of all birth injuries in women, repair of jagged teeth—in short, elimination of unnecessary abuse of any tissue is a commonsense method of helping to guard against the development of cancer.
