RECEIVE POLIO SHOT AT SCHOOL

Vaccination for polio of the first and second grades of Smith River and Redwood Union Schools was held on Tuesday morning, April 26th at Redwood Union school at Fort Dick.

148 children received the inoculation, administered by Dr. Paul Ronniger, assisted by County Health Nurse, Mrs. Ethel De Martin and Miss Charlotte Thompson, school nurse, and Mrs. Mary Fisher, and Mrs. Nora Jacobson, Smith River. The second shot will be given in a month.

DUST AVAILABLE FOR SHEEP TICKS

This spring, woolgrowers can buy a new and more effective dust for control of sheep ticks. The dust—one-half percent dieldrin—gives complete control after one thorough treatment. Tests at the Wyoming Agriculture Experiment Station proved this dust better than all other dusts tried. Yes, "complete effectiveness" is due to two reasons: (1) It acts as a tailor-made poison for sheep ticks, and (2) it stays in the wool long enough to kill the young ticks as they hatch. Dusts used previously usually wear out too soon to kill hatching ticks and often leave some older ones alive to raise some more pests.

Dusting all sheep with the new dust just once after shearing will rid a flock of all ticks. The new dust will cost 75 cents to a dollar more for a 50-pound sack, but its better control means lower cost in the long run.

In dusting, take the usual precautions. Run sheep with the wind and keep out of the dust as much as possible.

The dust does not make the meat unsafe to eat, or the sheep hazardous to shear the next year. Tests by the station have gained Federal Food and Drug Administration approval for using the dust on sheep.

The tests proved that no poison remained in the carcass 90 days after dusting. Wool held dieldrin none remained 191 afterwards.
