**STAR-OF-THE-SEA CHURCH IS FIRST TO BE BUILT IN CURRY COUNTY**

St. Mary Star-of-the-Sea Catholic Church, built on the South bank of the Sixes River, near the mouth, appears to have been the county's first church edifice. It was put up in the early 90's, by F. J. Masterson, upon land, title to which probably bears the county's oldest date of record. This title is an example of government generosity to its defenders when the Union was not as well fixed to meet its commitments as now.

In Curry County's first Volume of deeds, on page 150, is recorded in April, of 1861, Patrick Hughes' title to some 160 acres in Lots 2, 3 and 4 of Sec. 2, Twp. 32 N.R. 16 W.W.M., a map of which is recorded further along on page 215.

This tract had been awarded to Penthisilla Nutt in lieu of the bounty the government promised her late husband, Moses F. Nutt, a private in Capt. Guthrie's Co., Ohio Militia, for services in the War of 1812. The widow, apparently dubious about her windfall, assigned her holding to Gen. U.S. Grant, and by the general to Patrick Hughes, with President Andrew Jackson signing the transfer papers.

Patrick, born in Ireland in 1830, came to Curry in 1860, with his wife, Jane O'Neil, then about 20, and likewise born in the Emerald Isle. All their seven children were born there on their ranch, the first, Edward, having been born there in '61. In the voters' census of the county, 1902, Edward sets himself down as 41, born in Oregon and living in Sixes.

The second Hughes son, James, as for many years keeper of Cape Blanco light, quite close to a home ranch, I have no record
