

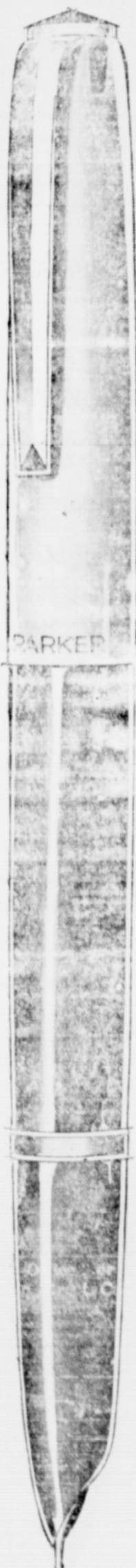

Give Fundamentals Of Gardening Veteran Rebekahs Honored Tuesday

As some folks are figuring on a bit of gardening, a few fundamentals may be reasonably submitted.

Hoping you worked in a good jug of sawdust, it's time to start loosening up the surface so as to conserve ground moisture—and keep it up, all summer. An inch or two of drying earth on top is mighty good fertilizer and should be raked loose again, after each sprinkling. And don't walk on our garden any more than you have to. A good soaking around each plant base beats a fine mist over the whole area.

Two necessities for any life are food and water. Fore-going either for appreciable periods either retards or stops life. Humans are adapted to three meals a day, every day, and more, when growing. Plants eat all day, every day, so it is needful that they have their food available at all times. They need water to sop up their grub and haul it up to make posies or spuds or popcorn—and if they don't have water and food "no dice!"

Various plants, like various animals, require different foods, but in general, they can all be teased into function with any good garden fertilizer, applied in dabs, every so often, depending upon the species and not a violent change all at once, or maybe twice—and soak it in!

Assuming you reader, have a trade or profession in which it took you a long time to become competent. Bear in mind that top success in any other profession goes to he or she who has spent time in it comparable to your apprenticeship. So if you're a bang up good leg caller and would like to garden, do as well as you have reasoned the requirements for successful gardening and, perhaps, over a long period of trial and error you can give over summing swine for your cookies.
