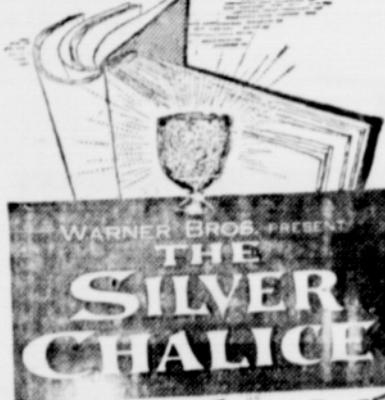

**Tell of Background  
of Bob Williams**

Bob Williams lived a story book but would have emphatically been the last to admit it. His nearly four score years were in keeping with the times when a young man's future lay to the west and his own ingenuity. Born in a Virginia, creeping up from devastation of the War Between the States, he never knew much about a small down deposit and monthly payments. He was educated to accumulate as he could, to satisfy his wants or do without and, with the years, he had periods of doing without unnecessary things to sustain himself until things looked better.

By occupation, Bob was a mechanic, hunter, wood-hacker, dairyman, hog-raiser, a diversification of trades strange to our times and quite necessary to his. And to cap his differences from the younger folk, Bob took Blue Ribbons for his pastry and cake exhibits at the several county fairs.

Robert Lee Williams died, in Seattle May 8, 1955, and was laid to rest in Brookings beside his second wife Sarah, who died a month over four years before him. Several years ago "Bob" bought and made plans for the placing of a double-named headstone for them. He was survived by a son, Orrin, of Seattle, at whose home he passed on. Sarah was the widow of the late Robert Freeman, Texas born, and the mother of Wilson Freeman and Mrs. Freddie Klaudas, of Coos Bay. Bob and Grandma Freeman were married in 1928.

Three years before Bob came to Curry County where his first job was with Milt Foster, cutting wood for Ed Kemp. Later moving into a cabin on the Freeman homestead, at the head of Jack's Creek, where he and his bride ranched for some 20 years till trading that place for one closer to town. When Mrs. Williams died, Bob sold the place and moved to Myrtle Point to make his home, returning each Memorial Day to visit his wife's grave and tidy it up.

Bob was an artist with woods and metals. Each of his pall bearers are the proud owners of some of his craft, given to them years before.

But the greatest legacy he left was his having been a living example of supporting himself and these dependent upon him through being handy at more than one craft. Few could equal or excel Bob in these.

**Coast Association  
Urges 101 Inclusion**

Inclusion of the Oregon Coast highway in the multi-billion dollar federal road building program gained impetus this week with the announcement that Walter Norblad, representative from the 1st district has introduced a resolution into congress to that effect. The announcement was made by Don Houghton, president of the Oregon Coast Association which is leading the fight to have the coast's 400 miles of highway included in the program. Funds from this source would mean the building of the bridge across the Columbia at Astoria and realignment and widening of the Gold Beach-Brookings bottleneck.

"Wires have been sent to Oregon's congressional delegation in both house and senate," Houghton said, "and our governor and state highway commission, who will play a big part in what highways are included, are being urged to give U. S. 101 first consideration.
