1. Anyone interested in raising flowers, shrubs, etc. or using them to the best advantage of the home, whether a member of the club or not, is invited to enter exhibits. 2. Entries will enter exhibition from 7:30 Saturday, May 28th. 3. Awards shall be: Blue Ribbon for FIRST; Red for SECOND; White for THIRD; Green for Honorable Mention. Only one in each class, according to the Standard System of Judging. (Judges will be from out of town).

4. Sweetstake Prizes will be awarded to the winner of the greatest number of Blue Ribbons in Horticulture classes. Also, in Artistic Arrangement class. 5. Only one entry in each division or subdivision may be made by an exhibitor. 6. No State Conservation material is to be included in any exhibit.

7. All entries in Horticultural classes MUST BE GROWN by exhibitor. 8. Flowers and foliage in Arrangement classes need not be grown by exhibitor. 9. Horticulture specimens must be correctly labeled. Tags and containers furnished by committee. 10. Each exhibitor will furnish containers, marked with owners name on the bottom for all artistic arrangements.

11. All measurements refer to COMBINED HEIGHT of CONTAINER and MATERIALS. 12. Containers must be called for at 5:00 p.m. on May 29th. Second morning of show open from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon for photographers.
