80 PERCENT OF ACCIDENTS ON OPEN ROAD

Approximately 80 percent of the 420 traffic fatalities recorded in Oregon last year took place in "open-road" smash-ups outside the limits of any incorporated city or town, statewide accident records show.

This percentage, which holds fairly constant from year to year, is due to the higher speeds at which highway traffic normally moves, Secretary of State Earl T. Newby said. He said a collision at 25 miles-an-hour city speeds is much less likely to inflict serious personal injury or death than a similar collision taking place even at normal highway cruising speeds.

When summertime vacation driving swells the traffic volume on rural highways, exposure to serious accidents reaches the high point of the year, the secretary explained. The result frequently is a heavier death toll in the summer months than during the adverse w other conditions of the winter season.

This condition, which plagues all states, is the purpose behind the nation-wide "Slow Down and Live" program now under way. Newby pointed out. "Slow Down and Live" is an intensified educational and enforcement campaign aimed at reducing summer traffic deaths by concentrating on the "in a hurry" driver who takes chances in high speed traffic.

The greatest contributor to highway traffic fatalities is the driver with the "me first" attitude, as displayed by such actions as following too close, passing when unsafe to do so, and driving too fast for conditions, safety men contend.

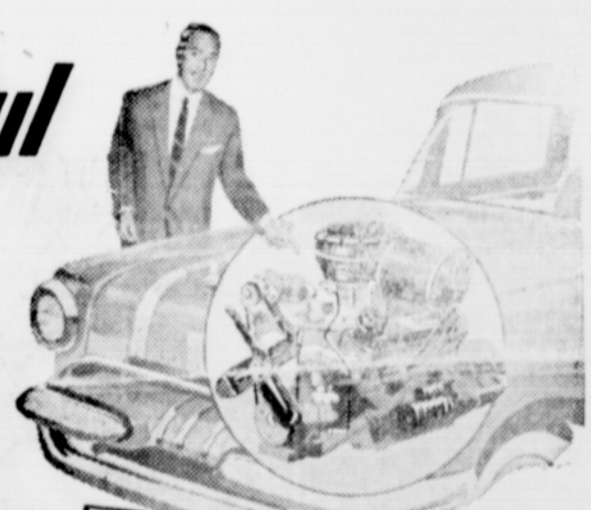

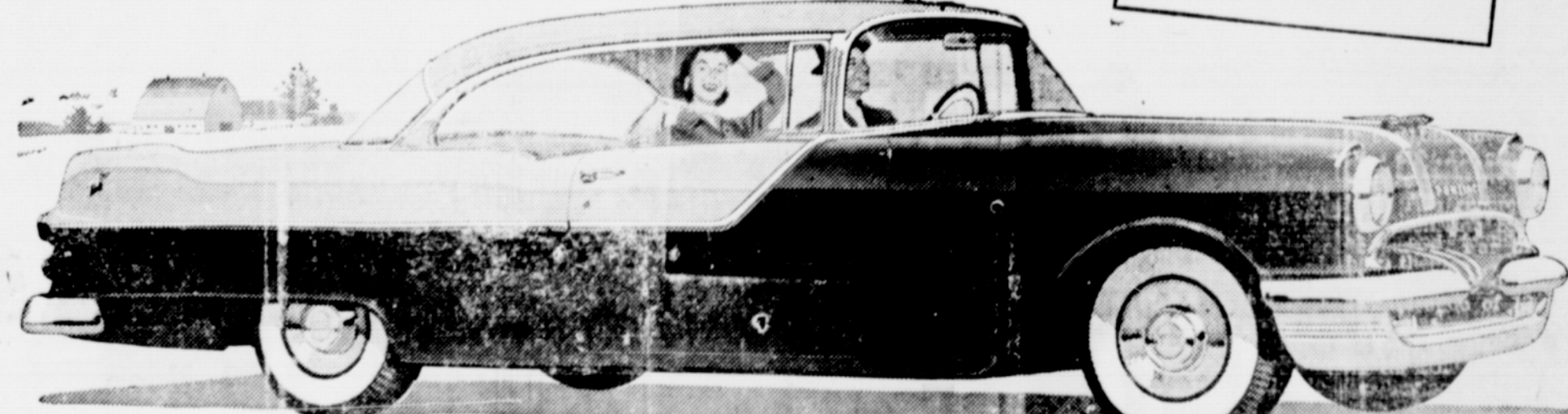
