sun of \$11,958.00 over and above the sum inside the 6 per cent limitation. An approval of the budget means just that and nothing more.

5. The total sum proposed to be raised in taxes on city property for the operations of the City of Brookings between July 1, 1955 and June 30, 1956 is \$41,208.00. This is solely to pay the expenses of the city government for one year. There is no place within the proposed budget where the purchase of a sewer system, a water system, or any other property is authorized.

6. The actual expense of operating the City from July 1, 1955 to June 30, 1956, cannot exceed the sum of \$70,673.00. Of this sum \$14,752.00 will be received from the State of Oregon. This leaves a balance of \$55,921.00. Of this balance the sum of \$14,713.00 will be received from sources other than direct taxes. The remainder of \$41,208.00 is the sum to be raised by direct taxes.

7. The undersigned members of the Budget Committee and the City Council respectfully show to the people of Brookings that the proposed budget is fair and means just what it says and nothing more. It is further shown that the City of Brookings is being operated in an efficient manner and at a most reasonable cost. The City of Brookings shall continue to have, if the people approve this budget, one of the smallest tax levies of any city in the State of Oregon.

8. The undersigned respectfully state to the voters of Brookings that this proposed and published budget be adopted and, as a result the Council be permitted to raise the sum of \$11,958.00 in excess of the six per cent limitation. A "yes" vote at the special election means that the City will receive this additional sum of \$11,958.00. It means just that and nothing more. It means that the City may operate during the next fiscal year upon a business basis, and, so operating will benefit all of us who live in Brookings.
