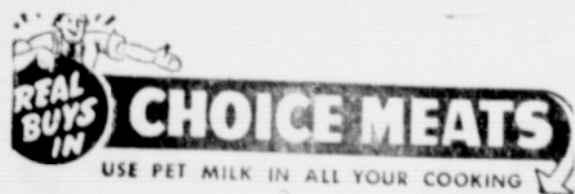

### BOWLING TOURNAMENT IN BROOKINGS ENDS JUNE 5th

The Second Annual Brookings Handicap Bowling Tournament drew to a close June 5th during almost unprecedented heat. Most of the competitors were from Eureka and Coos Bay in the closing groups. While the heat bothered most it didn't stop a Coos Bay girl, Deila Knapp, from turning in one of the outstanding performances in the tournament. She and her partner captured first place in the women's doubles. She placed first in singles and all events. Her all events score of 1811 is the highest rolled this year in any of the Northwest tournaments as far as we have been able to determine.

Brookings bowlers fared quite well, with the Kerr Hardware and Electric women's team ending up in first place with the exceptionally high score of 2702.

In the men's doubles, Larry Roemick and Gordon Olsen placed fourth, Ted Keiser and Gordon Miller fifth, Mack Malcolm and Frank Burdell seventh, Don Vaughn and Art Guthrie ninth, and Bob and Les Dimmick twelfth. In the singles Frank Burdell placed second, Virg Goldsberry tenth, Art Guthrie seventh and Irv Jones seventeenth. In all events Frank Burdell placed third, Art Guthrie seventh and Irv Jones eleventh.

In the women's doubles Miriam Rettke teamed up with Ruth Goetter of Hillsboro to take second with Pat Helrig and Kathy Pototnik third and Muriel Butrick and Ersa Fischer fifth. In the singles Ersa Fischer took eighth, Marge Goldsberry tenth and Doris Freeman eleventh. In all events Ersa Fischer placed third, Miriam Rettke fourth, Kathy Pototnik fifth, and Muriel Butrick ninth.

In this tournament there were approximately 300 entries, with Coos Bay, Portland, Roseburg, Grants Pass, Medford, Eureka, Crescent City, Hillsboro and Brookings represented.

#### REPORTED DEAD

"Bill" Thomas died of a heart attack, last Saturday. With his brothers and sister he was raised and went to school here, the family living in the present home of the P. D. Starks, in what is now known as the Easy Street area.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that on July 7th, 1955, between the hours of 8:00 o'clock A.M. and 8:00 o'clock P.M. a special election shall be held within the corporate limits of the City of Brookings, Oregon, in the Council Chamber in the City Hall within said City, upon the following proposition, to wit:

In the fiscal period of 1955-56 the Council of the City of Brookings, Curry County, Oregon, is authorized to levy a tax of \$11,958.00 for the purpose of balancing the City Budget for said fiscal period, which tax is to be outside the limitations on taxation in Article XI, Section 11, Oregon Constitution.

This proposition, if adopted, will permit the Council of the City of Brookings, Oregon, to increase the 1955-56 tax levy in the sum of \$11,958.00 outside of the limitation on taxation in Article XI, Section 11, Oregon Constitution.

The boundary of the precincts in which the polling place aforesaid has been established will be the corporate limits of the City of Brookings.
