TO ALL SCOUTERS, ORGANIZATIONS, CLUBS, BOY AND GIRL SCOUTS AND GENERAL PUBLIC OF BROOKINGS AND HARBOR

Below is a list of Financial Items and what the Chetco Scout Building Committee has been trying to do for the past 6 years. In 1949 myself, John Ginther, Father Denham, Lucile Molino and several others, with the help of the American Legion, and the Odd Fellow Lodge, started a scout building program, the town needed a meeting place for all of our scouts, both boy and girl. Then in 1950, Dewey Akers, Mr. Goldsberry and Mr. Gribble joined our committee and set up what is now known as "The Chetco Scout Building Committee." Troop 32, sponsored by the Odd Fellows, started a building fund in the Curry County Bank. Later the Cub Scouts and the Girl Scouts joined in a financial campaign. We soon had around 500 dollars in the bank.

The Committee then started looking for a building site. Mr. Ward King donated a lot to the Scouts. The deed states, land can be used for scouting use only. Mr. King has moved away since then, his idea was that the land would benefit the Scouts only. That is the way the Committee worked, trying to get a building for all of the Scouts of Brookings-Harbor, to have their meetings in, and their respective committee. A building is to be sponsored by a General Scouting Committee from all the different organizations in our district.

To date the building, located on the Azalea Park Road, has all of the concrete work done, with a complete floor. All of the roughing in plumbing is in, plenty of lumber on hand for trusses and roof. Concrete blocks are ordered, and contracted to be laid.

The Committee wishes to thank all, who have helped so far on this deal. But to get the building completed and run after it is completed, will take a lot more help yet, both financially and hard work on a committee. There is a drive on now for funds for the concrete blocks, when you buy these blocks or donate, you can be sure that the money stays here for this project. We have some good men on the committee working, to get more organizations and all of the general public more interested. Ted Freeman and Bill Campbell and Fox Brothers have stated that they will haul the concrete blocks in free.

Let's Build A Scout Building, Get Behind The Program and Watch Scouting Grow in the Brookings-Harbor Area. Other towns around us have a good Scouting program, we should have too, and we will if we have a place of the "Scouts Own" for them to meet in and some stronger and More Scout Committees working.
