Dear Mayor Brimm:  
The Unemployment Compensation Commission appreciates the help you gave our Mr. Cone when he was in the city of Brookings

to make a preliminary survey on the possible need for local service in employment service and claims. The budgetary allocations under which we operate on a Federal grant have not as yet been made, and we are not certain whether we shall be able to continue on about the same level as we are

at the present time, or whether we might be forced to reduce our operations somewhat, or we might be able to expand. Until such time as we have more definite information, no commitment can be made. In addition, the workloads for our service during the summer months will probably

be rather low. I can assure you that it is the Commission's intent to give serious consideration to offering at least an itinerant service for the city of Brookings beginning this fall.
