SPORTSMEN NET BIG MEAT CROP

Based on current prices, Oregon's wildlife provided over \$9,000,000 worth of "meat in the pot" to hunters and fishermen in 1954 according to figures released by the Oregon Game Commission.

Kill records returned by hunters and punch cards returned by fishermen show that deer provided the most meat poundage followed by salmon, and steelhead, then by ducks, pheasants, and elk. The total value of the 11,248,000 pound of meat provided by 112,480 deer harvested was \$5,061,600.00. Sport fishermen recorded a total of 91,683 salmon taken for a poundage of 1,375,245 and a meat value of \$1,237,720.00.

Broken down into their respective categories, big game animals provided 13,248,000 pounds of meat valued at \$5,961,600.00; upland game birds provided 670,750 pounds of meat which was valued at \$462,815.50; waterfowl

BIOLA Caravan To Come Here To Bible Church

The Bible Institute of Los Angeles has entered into a new phase of service this year by taking the classroom of the school into ten churches strategically located in Washington, Oregon and Idaho. The Brookings Bible Church has been chosen for a week's conference in this area. This conference is known as the BIOLA Campus Caravan.

The personnel of the Caravan consists of the teachers and professors of the school. Those who will participate in the Brookings Conference will be: Professor William Ebeling, who prior to coming to BIOLA to teach was a missionary to China. He had a thrilling escape from the Communists. He now teaches Doctrines in the BIOLA Bible College. Professor Ebeling will bring messages in the morning sessions of the Conference on Galatians and will help out with the preaching in the evenings.

Mr. Ebeling was born in China, the son of missionary parents. After his training in America, it seemed natural for him to return to China in 1934 to serve as a missionary. He spent 18 years as a missionary under the China Inland Mission, and in 1952 he was expelled by the Communist People's Government in April, after four and one-half months under house-arrest. His last term of Bible Institute of Los Angeles.

In January, 1953, Mr. Ebeling came to Los Angeles to teach in the Bible Institute and has been there since. He received his A.B. from Wheaton College and his M.Th. from Dallas Theological Seminary.

Rev. Harry Sturz, teacher of the Bible Department will bring messages on the book of Romans in the morning sessions.

Mr. Sturz was born in San Diego, California. He received his B.A. from Westmont College at Santa Barbara, California, took work at the Dallas Theological Seminary in Texas, and was graduated from Grace Seminary in has taught at Grace Seminary and held a pastorate in Harrah, Washington in the Yakima Valley. He is married and has four children. Mr. Sturz has been teaching Greek and New Testament at the BIOLA Bible College since the Fall of 1953.

Miss Betty McCullough, of the Christian Education Department at the Institute will bring a series of studies on Christian Education at the same time.

She is a graduate of the University of California and the Bible Institute of Los Angeles and has had experience in the fields of secular and religious education.

Miss Dorothy Green, a singer, will come as a member of the team.

Miss Green is secretary and assistant to Mr. Earle Hullin, Director of the Music Department at the Bible Institute of Los Angeles.

The purpose of this new venture is to acquaint people with the faculty members of BIOLA and to allow them to share in some of the blessings to be derived from classroom exercises.

The general plan is to conduct two classes in the morning, to be taught by members of the team. The afternoons will be kept open. The evening services will begin at 7:30 with a program of congregational singing and special music, followed by an inspirational message, after which, one of Dr. Talbot's travel films will be shown. These films will include: "They Wait for Peace," "I Saw Borneo," "India's Sorrow," "The Land Time Forgot," and "I Saw Petra."

Rev. Harold L. Scholes, Pastor of the huge Baptist Tabernacle in Los Angeles will be present on the opening day. Rev. Scholes will lead the singing that day.

The BIOLA Campus Caravan will begin on Sunday morning, August 7 and will continue on through Friday, August 12. The morning sessions will begin at 9:30 and continue for two hours. The evening sessions will begin at 7:30. The Conference will be held in the Brookings Bible Church.
