Hold Up Well

Lumber production, shipment and order figures through July for the Douglas fir region of Washington and Oregon were released today by Harris E. Smith, secretary of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association.

The weekly average of West Coast lumber production in July was 157,768,000 b.f. or 84% of the 1950-54 average. Orders averaged 182,500,000 b.f.; Shipments were 184,631,000 b.f.; Weekly averages for June were: Production 190,724,000 b.f.; 101.8% of the 1950-54 average; Orders 202,562,000 b.f.; Shipments 207,686,000 b.f.

Seven months of 1955 cumulative production 5,747,806,000 b.f.; Seven months of 1954, 5,135,868,000 b.f.; Seven months of 1953, 5,910,965,000 b.f.

County Agent Tells

Of Root Weevils

Root weevils frequently migrate into homes where they are a rather annoying pest, says Ken Priest, County Extension Agent. The particular species now evident in many homes is the rough strawberry root weevil. They will not, adds Priest, do any damage to foodstuffs in the home. They will not injure the household furnishings or the home itself.

Root weevils are rather difficult to control when they move into a home. DDT is helpful in killing the weevil if it can be placed where the insect can come into contact with the DDT. DDT acts slowly and may lead one to believe that it is ineffective.

The common aerosol bomb is quite effective in killing the weevil if the mist can be applied directly to the insect.

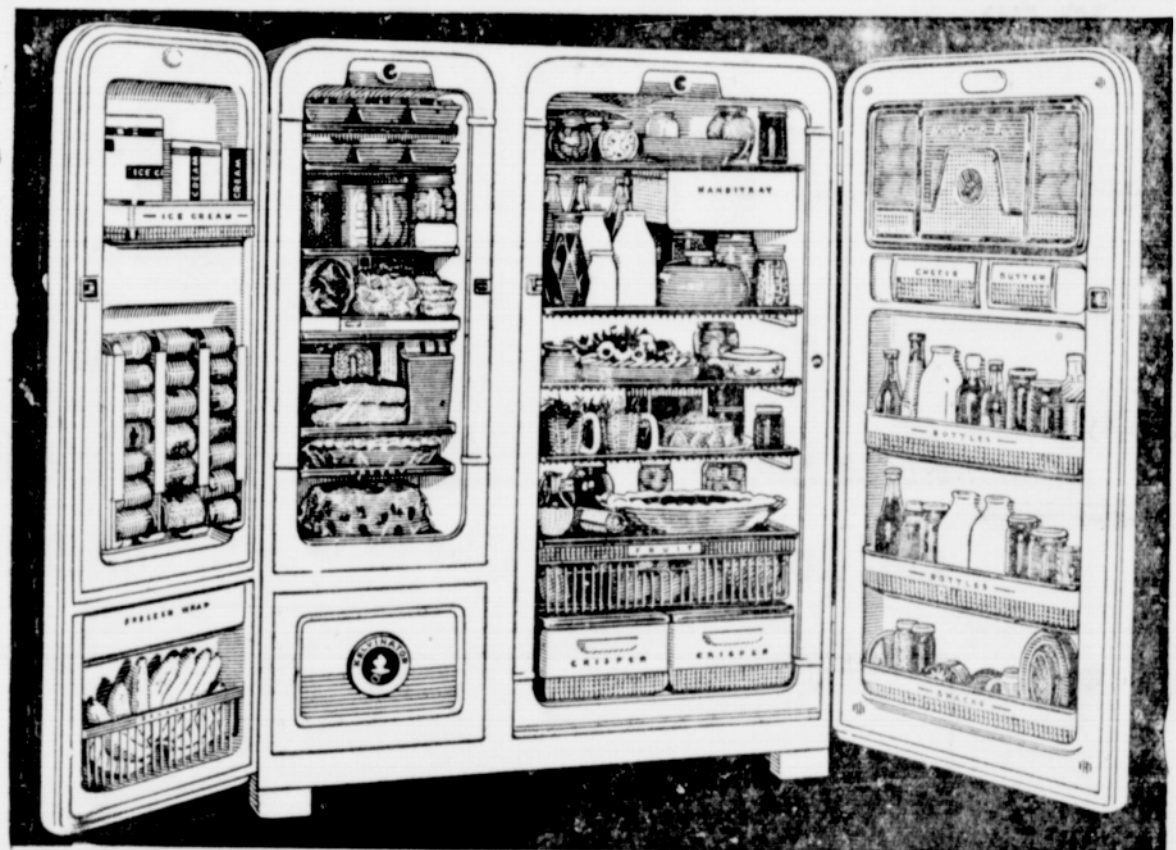
