## Article On Brookings GOC Post In Magazine

## COAST GROUP APPOINTS MAN

A Portland man with an outstanding record in organizational work has been named by the Oregon Coast Association to head the second phase of the non-profit travel promotion group's expanding activities, according to Don Houghton, President.

Allan Flint, 61, formerly manager of a large four state mid-west retail dealers association was selected from a large number of applicants by the executive committee, Houghton added, to take charge of the drive to double the organization's membership.

Selection of Flint will permit the association's manager and public relations director, Verne Ayers, more time for travel promotion and attention to U. S. 101 highway improvement.

The association is the largest and oldest organization of its kind in the Pacific Northwest and numbers all of the county courts, most of the Chambers of Commerce, and many of the civic clubs, wholesale and retail businesses in the seven coastal counties and in Del Norte county, California, and Pacific county, Washington in its membership.

Among travel promotion activities so far this year the association has published and distributed 75,000 copies of an improved and expanded 32 page travel guide to the Oregon Coast. It has also obtained television and radio time on the Portland and valley stations, instigated nation wide publicity in magazines and newspapers. September issue of SUNSET will feature the entire Oregon Coast in story and picture.

Flint will work through the association's county units primarily, Houghton said, and will be in the field most of the time.
