### COOS-CURRY PLANS FIGHT

A release from the Coos-Curry Electric Co-op describes the refusal of the state hydroelectrical commission to grant a preliminary permit for engineering studies for a hydroelectric dam on the Illinois River as a "legal nullity."

Ivan Laird, president of the Coos-Curry board, stated the board's action was to vote unanimously to continue preliminary studies with the purpose of seeking a license to build.

"In view of the fact the federal power commission granted us a permit to proceed in May," said Laird, "we are following our attorney's advice that the recent holding of the U. S. Supreme Court in the Pelton Dam case applies also to this case. In that decision the Supreme Court held that under the property clause of the Constitution the federal government reserved solely to itself the power to issue licenses to construct dams on so-called reservations of the United States and that Oregon had no right to veto the federal power commission's exercise of federal authority by refusing a state permit."

The board has hired Scott Blair, well-known ichthyologist, on a consulting basis to study the fish problem in this remote and inaccessible area on which no real studies have been made to date. Laird said the board is very serious about its responsibility to protect fish life and fish spawning grounds in the Illinois River.

Regarding the state hydroelectrical commission's objection to the cost of power generated at the proposed dam, the board states it would not consider building the dam unless it were both economical and feasible. Until preliminary studies are completed, they pointed out, there can be no real determination of power costs.

Permission from the state to complete these studies was the reason for requesting a permit from the state.

"The board hired John S. Cotton an internationally known hydro-electrical engineer to select a feasible site for a dam," said Laird. "He worked for only three months, and told us that his estimate of 6.48 mills per kilowatt hour for the firm power delivered to Gold Beach was the highest possible cost, and would probably be considerably lower by the time a firm figure can be determined."
