## PARKING METERS PAY BIG

Parking meters are netting the City of Brookings around \$250 a month with the net to be doubled, at least, after the current year. Collections for June amounted to \$605 and for July, \$501, the meter boxes being tapped every Tuesday, according to the city records. The meters originally cost the city over \$11,000, including the machine for sorting and counting the coins. Of this sum half the take goes to the suppliers and over \$8,000 has already been paid them. The \$3,000 difference should be forthcoming this fiscal year. Then the entire take, probably around \$3,000 per year, will then go to the City. Currently, this money is going into the general fund.
