ACCIDENT RATE GOES UP IN JULY

A number of multiple-death traffic accidents during the past four weeks has almost wiped out Oregon's fatality reduction earned since the first of the year, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry reported Friday.

Three accidents within three weeks, each of which claimed four lives, and several others in which from two to three persons were killed has brought the states fatality toll to 209, just four less than the 213 deaths recorded at the same time last year.

Going into June, Newberry said, Oregon's death count was eight percent below the count for the first five months of 1954.

As August progresses, the slight advantage still remaining seems to be disappearing as fatal accident reports continue to come in at an accelerated pace, the secretary said. Over three fourths of the death-dealing mishaps are taking place on open highways outside the limits of incorporated cities or towns.
