BOND SALE UP IN OREGON

Oregon continues to have the highest percentage of increase in Savings Bonds sales in the nation, according to word received by Ted Gamble, Chairman of the Oregon Savings Bonds Committee, from the United States Treasury Department. "Total Oregon sales of E and H Bonds for the first-half of this year were forty percent more than for the same period a year ago," Mr. Gamble said. "Florida was the second highest state with an increase of thirty-two percent. National sales at the end of June were 14% ahead of June a year ago."

Oregonians purchased another near-record volume of E and H Bonds in July. Mr. Gamble reported, with sales amounting to \$3,997,909. This represents a 5.8% increase over July of 1954, which was by far the best month of that entire year. H Bond sales were
