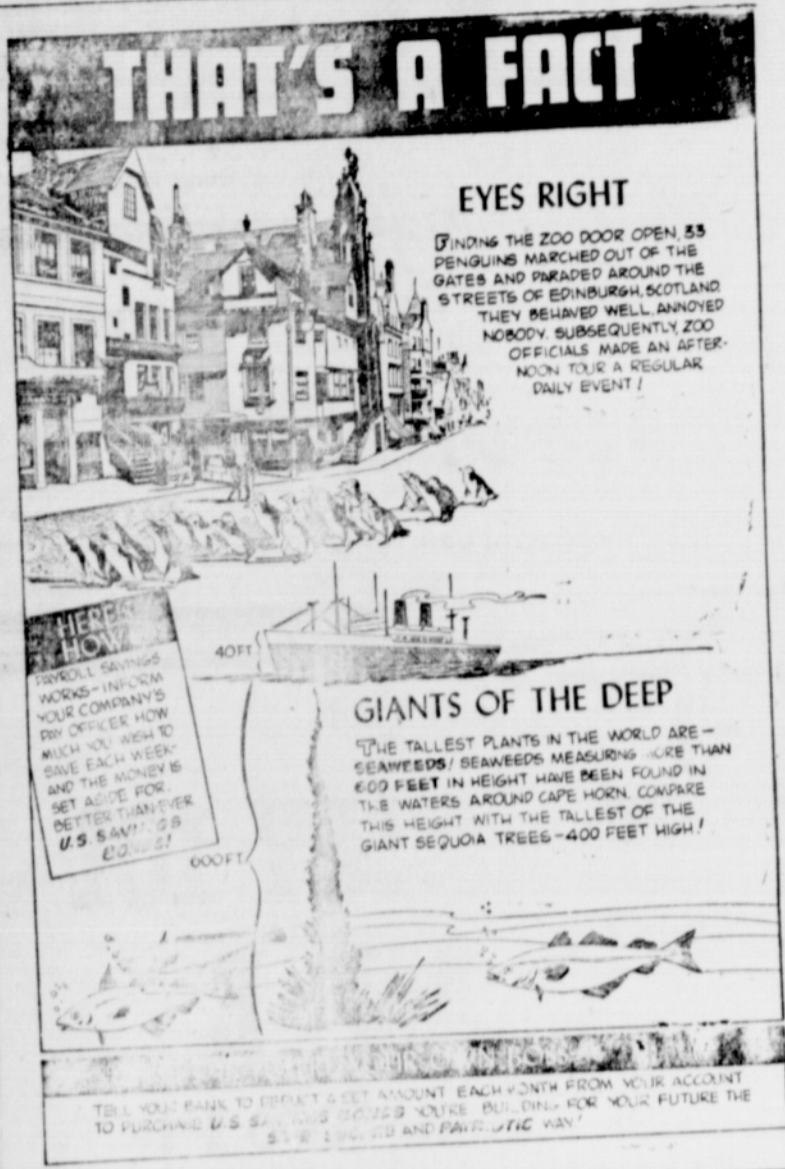

Disregarding, for the moment, the "foreign travel" on this stretch of road and devoting some thought to where we countyites figure, Highway 101 is the artery upon which we depend for our existence. Over it comes and goes all the necessities sustaining our niche in the world.

Continuing our focus upon we who live here and the injustice, for the present, as an instance, at least half the taxpayers of Curry County are being charged for a hospital so situated to be, moderately speaking, inconvenient.

Because of much preferred, and recently very much improved, highway to the south, in California, those requiring hospitalization head for or are packed into Crescent City. Families prefer their patients there and for three valid reasons: First, it is their habit; Second, it is the quickest route to relief; and Third, it is much easier to visit those under treatment.

A very important factor are the compensation cases. At present, many of them from say, below Carpenterville, are routed into Crescent City, and State of Oregon funds are being paid to California, funds which would in all probability, be very welcome to the Curry County Hospital.

Each of us Curryites can easily figure out our own private gripe because we can't get back and forth, between Gold Beach and the State Line as we would like. We'd like to take a crack at the salmon runs to the north, we'd like it more convenient to do business to the north and not detest trips, which absolutely require our going—court attendance, etc. We'd like to take the boat trip up the Rogue and lay in a stash of Agness grub. We'd like to socialize with the up-county folks and have them socialize more with us—Grange, Garden Clubs, Chambers of Commerce, Rotary, and such. We'd like to have it easier for our county officials to better familiarize themselves with their balliwick.

But we can't blame anyone for hesitating, for giving the matter of moving between central and southern Curry very deep and serious consideration before venturing over a road so deviously up, down and sideways.

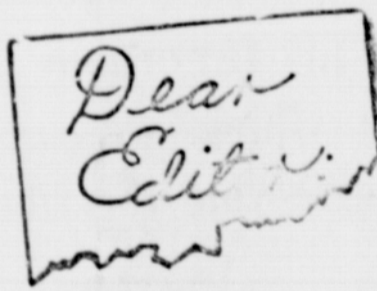
