Smith River Navy Man Is Killed In Auto Accident

Word has been received in Smith River, telling of the death of Jesse F. Sanderson, 18, a native of Smith River, who was killed in an automobile accident while on duty in the United States Navy at

Lebo, Kansas, on September 1. He is a graduate of Smith River elementary school and attended Del Norte high school. He entered the Navy on August 28, 1954. He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Harriet Sanderson, his grandmother, Amelia Brown, a brother, Gerald Sanderson, two aunts, Mrs. Bernice Coughlin, and Mrs. Anna Sanderson, all of Smith River.

Funeral services will be held at Wier's Mortuary Chapel in Crescent City at 2 p.m. Rev. Don Chase will officiate. Interment will be in the Smith River Indian Cemetery. Military graveside services will be conducted by Veterans of the Foreign Wars. Assisting the military escort will be an honor escort from the 77th Air Force unit at Klamath, California.

Tree Farms Important To Area Future

Twenty new west coast tree farms were certified on August 30 at a board meeting of the Industrial Forestry Association and additions made to existing tree farms which increased the certified acreage in the Douglas fir region by 176,801 acres.

Ten of the new tree farms are in Washington and ten in Oregon. They range in size from the tiny 20-acre Penner Grant tree in Isard County, Washington to the 124,694-acre industrial holdings of the Timber Service Company in Linn County, Oregon.

"The wide variation in area of these tree farms," said R. F. Morse, Longview, chairman of IFA, "shows that it is not the size of the tree farm that counts, but the intent of the owner to grow trees."

Morse said the certification of the 160-acre Agnes B Harmon tree farm in Hood River county marks the first time a tree farm has been certified in that county. Now there are tree farms in every one of the 38 counties in the Douglas fir belt of Oregon and Washington.

There is another first in this current certification, Morse pointed out. For the first time the number of certified tree farms in this region have passed the 300 mark, now totaling 304. Slightly over 230,000 acres have been approved this year in two other certifications in addition to this one.

Western Oregon now has 116 tree farms ranging from small farm woodlots to large industrial properties on which advanced for-

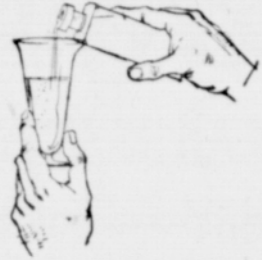

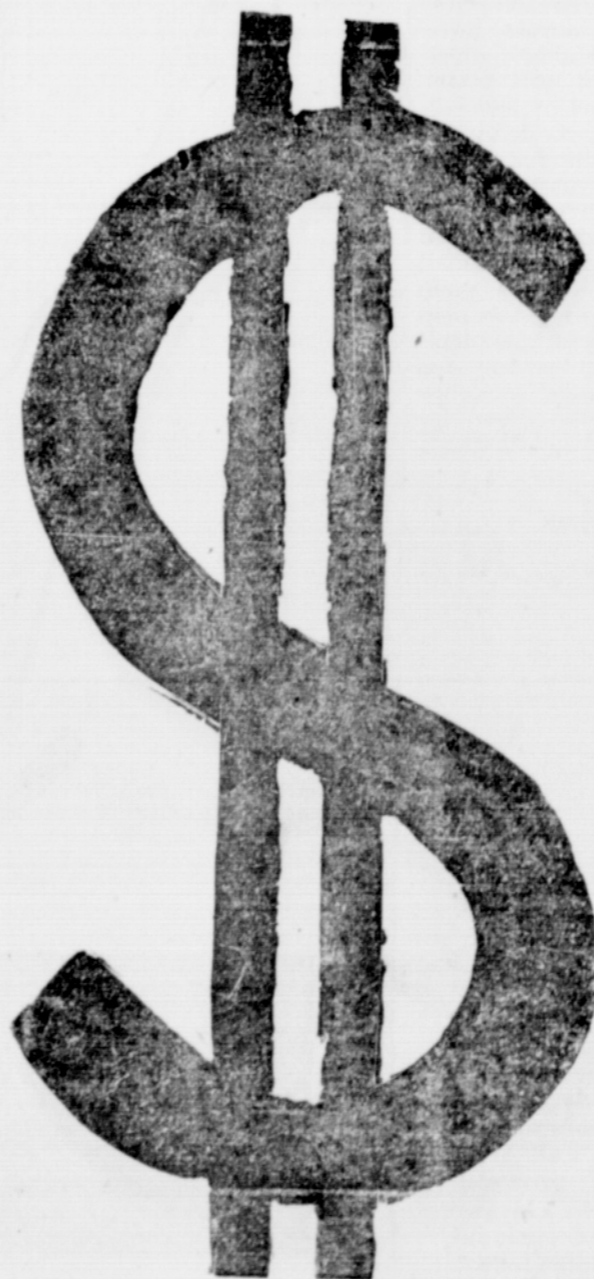
