FOR WHAT IT'S WORTH

Latest reports indicate that the highway hoodlums have won their first big victory. A car manufacturer has recently released information which practically admits that all hope is gone for safe and sane driving. The principal objective now, apparently, is merely to soften the blow.

Cars of tomorrow, according to the release, will have padded instrument panels since that is where so many front seat riders are injured in collisions. The steering wheel, another hazard, is also to take on a new shape which will be more yielding to a body thrown against it. Safety belts to hold one in place when a car is thrown on its side or into a somersault and bumpers all the way around to keep the sides from being caved in will aid the driver to stay alive and still have fun.

In other words, the fight to educate is being forsaken on the assumption that recklessness, selfishness, stubbornness and stupidity will always be with us. So long as morons can get drivers licenses and so long as courts seem reluctant to throw the book at the criminal who drinks, drives and terrifies, there seems little logic in preaching the gospel of safe driving.

Really, the car manufacturers are taking the only sensible way out of the mess. If it's going to be war on the highways, let's go prepared. We've been coming to it gradually anyway, for anyone today who says he enjoys taking his family for a trip on the highway is either tired of living or is himself one of the maniacs who make car travel a nightmare.

So let's accept the situation as it is. A trip to Grandma's can then be a thrill experience. With the entire family fitting into their mattress-stuffed uniforms, with heads protected by helmets, and with safety belts tightened, one can shout "tallyho" and head for the fray. With death possibility reduced, cars can crash all over the landscape, all in jolly fun.

When this time arrives, we can then feel we are at least being honest with ourselves. Today's attempted murder mayhem on the highway makes a mockery of law enforcement and justice. Tomorrow it may well become a legalized national past-time.

Lesmeister Is Named Area Representative

Pete J. Lesmeister, Past Exalted Ruler and currently secretary, of Brookings Elks Lodge, has been named by the Oregon State Elks association as the representative of its Visually Handicapped Children's committee in this area. Lesmeister will supply information on services provided by the Children's Eye Clinic at the University of Oregon Medical School in Portland. The clinic was founded six years ago under Oregon Elks leadership to help youngsters of needy parents. The state association's annual contributions to support the clinic now total more than \$70,000.

Daly's Celebrate

Sixty years ago this month two brothers from Ireland began what has become one of the oldest business concerns in this country and one of the oldest firms in the country to remain as a family enterprise during its long history. The entire month of September is being celebrated by Daly Bros. store; as the company concludes more than half a century of service to Humboldt county residents. The huge observance of this anniversary took place during part to make up for the lack of any special festivity during the company's 50th year. Their golden anniversary took place during World War II and for patriotic

reasons the company skipped the usual round of festivity which surrounds such an event. Cornelius and John Daly opened the first store then known as "The Arcade" at 217 F street. The shop featured "New Goods, New Prices and New People" as well as "Sound Values and Bed-rock Prices." At that time women's ready-to-wear was almost unknown; so consequently yardage goods, for making dresses and other wearing apparel was the big seller. In 1914 the original store area became too small to house the expanding Daly business so they leased new facilities in their present location at Fourth and F streets.

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Increase Reported In State Mishaps

Final tabulations of traffic accident, injury and death figures for the first six months of 1955 were released Friday by Secretary of State, Earl T. Newbry. The tabulation shows an increase in the number of accidents and the number of persons injured over the counts for the first half of 1954, the secretary said. There were 29,476 reported mishaps, 1,27 more than during the period ending June 30, 1954. Traffic injuries totalled 6,745, a gain of 516. Deaths during the six-months period dropped from 170 to 152, a decline of three percent. The death reduction, however, has been wiped out by increases in July and August, Newbry re-

ported. Through August, the toll is set at 252 as compared to 247 by the end of August a year ago. The box score on how the 170 traffic victims met death shows 26 pedestrian-motor vehicle fatalities; 56 collision with other motor vehicles; 5, motor vehicle-railroad train; 1, bicycle-motor vehicle; 36, hit fixed object; 10, overturned in roadway; 33, ran off highway; and 3, other non-collision mishaps.
