As we sweep away the last of summer's leaves, our lives settle down to more regular patterns. In one of your patterns of activity—meal planning—I hope to become a regular help.



Nutrition vs Overweight

Did you know that a nutritious diet is not a fattening diet? For example, wheat foods in a well-balanced diet are not fattening. It is simply overeating that causes overweight.

Did you know that to get into a dress one size smaller requires losing from ten to fifteen pounds?

Did you know that the finest cake and pastry flours and mixes are made from "soft wheat" varieties grown in Oregon?



It's DOUGHNUT TIME!

Doughnuts are on display at neighborhood grocery stores and cafes. Halloween, you know! Do you like to make your own—

here is a basic DOUGHNUT RECIPE

Beat 4 egg yolks or 2 whole eggs until light. Add 1 cup sugar, 2 T. melted butter, 1/4 cup milk. Beat together. Stir in 3 cups sifted all-purpose flour or 4 cups pastry flour, 1 t. salt, 1/4 t. nutmeg, 1/4 t. cinnamon. Add dry ingredients to liquid and mix together until well blended. Chill dough. Roll to 1/4 inch thickness. Cut with floured cutter. Fry in heated fat -375°. Slide doughnuts from spatula into hot fat. Fry on each side until golden brown. Remove, drain on absorbent paper.

SPECIAL TRICKS FOR DOUGHNUT TREATS:

Drop doughnuts in granulated red sugar, or cinnamon or chopped nuts, too, if you like. Try adding 2 tablespoons grated orange rind and substitute orange juice for the liquid. While warm, dip in powdered sugar. Add maple syrup and chopped nuts, serve warm with scoop of vanilla maple- nut ice cream. Lazy? Drop doughnuts into hot fat and have doughnuts.
