

Barrier Is Removed On Sixes River

Salmon and steelhead will find easier access to the upper reaches of Sixes river in Curry county following removal of a rock barrier this past week by the Coos Bay Lumber Company in cooperation with the state game commission.

A huge rock which log jams frequently have formed was blasted apart by a Coos Bay Lumber Company crew working with Walt Rychman, game commission stream clearance supervisor. The lumber company was also provided the equipment and material necessary to do the job. The rock barrier was located about 25 miles above highway 101.

The lumber company has also cleaned out many of the tributaries of the Sixes above the point where the rock barrier was removed.

According to the commission high water will wash out the remainder of the rock. Many additional miles of spawning area will be more accessible to migratory fish.

A warning is issued that people claiming help merely because they have been in the armed forces should be regarded as any other mendicant and should not be referred to any veterans' service officer unless they can show they are current members of some veterans group.

With the approaching holiday and winter season many foot-loose people will be on the move and some of them start out with the idea of being financed through sympathy. Although their stories may sound alright, and they may have undisputable evidence of having been in the service, unless they can prove they are contributing members to a veterans' organization they should be advised to apply to the welfare office, at Gold Beach. Such moneys as may be available for relief by local veterans groups anywhere are primarily for the relief of local contributing members, first; with tiding over local deserving non-members next; and local relief for anyone needing it, right here, next. If these funds are handed out to transients with sob stories there will be none left for the above designated uses.

This custom, which prevails in most organizations, should serve non-members with a warning that they are "on their own" if they neglect affiliating themselves.

Although men being compensated for disabilities by the Veterans Administration, or eligible for them, might be considered for local help they are still not regarded the responsibility of any veteran's group unless they are current members of one of them.

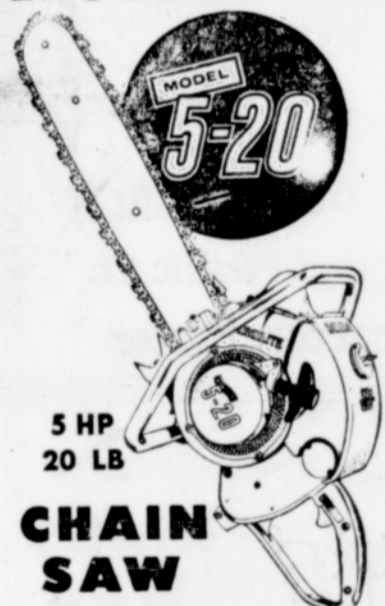

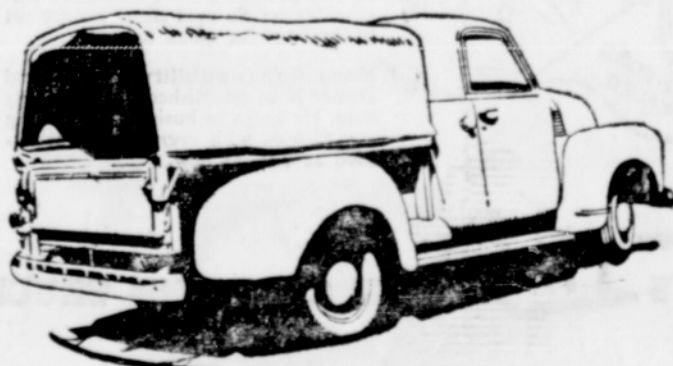
