At the overrunning of his home by the Japs, he entered the Artillery as an officer, was wounded several times, and finally imprisoned for three years and nine months in a concentration camp. Conditions during this period were almost unbelievably rugged and many did not survive. At present, he is nursing a broken foot, at the Chetco Inn, and hopes to make his permanent residence here.

Following Mr. deBruin's talk there was a "bull session" and plenty of refreshments.
